The auxiliary recently donated two blankets to the Belk family who lost their home and all their belongings in a recent fire. They resided near Riddle.

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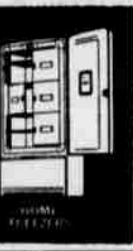
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COUNCIL OF CHURCH WOMEN HEAR GUEST SPEAKER, PLAN WORLD DAY OF PRAYER

LOOKINGGLASS HOME EXTENSION UNIT MEETING SCHEDULED

Mrs. Milton Vance and Mrs. C. Gatemann will be project leaders for Lookingglass Home Extension unit Tuesday, Feb. 21 at 10 a. m. "Making Lampshades" is the topic and a sack lunch will be served at noon.

Each is asked to bring 24 spring type clothespins, scissors, straight pins, needles, pencil, ruler, thumbtack, one package of white straight tape for each shade to be made, colorless nail polish or tube of Higgins vegetable glue or airplane glue.

Project leaders will have on hand some material, ring frames and the parchment paper and some trim for shades. Those who desire may bring their own material; three fourths yard is required for a shade and one and one half yard trim.

Those who wish to cover an old shade may bring them intact as the old shade must be used for a pattern. Shades with ribs will not be recovered. An 11 to 13 inch shade will require three fourths yard of material and ladies are asked not to bring material which stretches. A reasonable sum will be charged for materials used at the meeting.
