Oregon's Future School Needs Told By Marble Cook

For every classroom in the state today, we must prepare to have just that many more by 1960. And for every active teacher today, we must find an additional one by that time, stated Marble Cook, field representative of the Oregon Education association, before the Roseburg Rotary club Thursday noon.

With these statements, Cook pointed out the problems of education facing the people of Oregon—problems brought on by the high birth rate.

Speaking at the luncheon-meeting of Rotary in the Hotel Umpqua, Cook told the OEA is trying to present the facts of the situation to the people of the state, so they can begin plans to cope with it. The big resulting problem is where the finances are coming from. Education funds come from local, state and federal sources, but mostly from local. The best way to deal with the needed school expansion, Cook believes, is to use surplus funds now at Salem, rather than raise local taxes. House bill 193, which has been referred to the people for the next election, is one way to do this, he said. It would raise the percentage paid by the state to 45, from the present 30 percent. California pays 52 percent and Washington 68.

Cook pointed out how the biggest source of our present problem (birth rate) came about. In 1915, the state birth rate was about five percent less than the national average, but through heavy migration, continued until 1933 when Oregon's figure caught up with the national one; and it has remained there ever since.

The average number of births per year in Oregon has risen from 12,000 to 36,000 since 1933. This is due to an increase in population, naturally, and through heavy migration. "The state has been advertised too much," Cook said. "And, many people who came here during the war, have returned to stay." The result is evident.

The OEA asks that the citizens study the situation. "The problem will not take care of itself," Cook said. "We have nothing to lose and everything to gain" by facing the responsibility now.

The speaker was introduced by Paul S. Elliott, superintendent of schools, who also introduced Clyde Moore, junior high school music teacher. Moore directed five numbers by an all-reed band section, including two solos with piano accompaniment.

Bill Van Horn, student Rotarian, reported school activities to the membership.

Winston Theater Nears Completion

Winston residents are watching with growing interest the erection of the first local theater. The building, as nearing completion now, although the exact opening date is yet to be announced, Paul Bender, owner, promises that the theater will seat some 435 to 450 people in its capacity. This will be a boon to Winston as a theater-going community, because, until very recently, the town has been badly in need of recreational resources. Parking space will offer no problem to patrons coming by automobile, as a large lot has been provided adjoining the building on the south. Centrally located, just across from Edwards' Auto Court on highway 99 on the plot known as the Dobbins' sub-division, the theater will be within convenient reach of all our neighborhood, Bender said.

The design of the building is unique. Built on the quonset style, the outside finish is made attractive by the use of pumice blocks. Inside, the floors are being completed this week, and of unusual interest is the arching ceiling with its wide curving beams. Wiring is in progress also, the contract having been awarded to Winston Electric, another recent business establishment in this area, in charge of Russell Turner.

The owners are Mr. and Mrs. Minnie Dempsey of Roseburg, which brings us to the name of the theater. According to Mrs. Bender, it will be known as the "Ben-etia," a clever twist of family names. The first syllable is taken from the Bender's surname, the second taken from Mrs. Bender's Christian name.
