Chrysler Strike Peace

Prospects Are Brighter

DETROIT, Feb. 18.—(P)—A hopeful note—virtually the first in the 23-day Chrysler strike—sounded today as company and union agreed to step up negotiations.

Federal Mediator E. Marvin Sconyers said Chrysler Corp. spokesmen and officers of the CIO United Auto Workers planned to

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meet a little longer each day in an effort to get the corporation's 89,000 employees back on the job.

A total of more than 130,000 in the auto industry are idle.

The union, which struck Jan. 25, demanded either a 10-cent hourly wage boost or a funded pension plan with a voice in its administration.
