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Helen Clarke To Head Seal Sale To Aid Crippled Folk

Douglas county's chairman for the annual Easter seal sale by the Oregon Society for Crippled Children and Adults will be Mrs. Helen Clarke of 143 S. Kane street, Roseburg, according to an announcement received from Jesse Rosenbaum of Le Grande, society president.

Rosenbaum said the sale, the fourth sponsored by the society in Oregon, will be held from March 9 through Easter Sunday, April 9. More than 400,000 residents of the state will receive Easter seals through the mail, he stated.

In announcing Mrs. Clarke's appointment, Rosenbaum urged the people of Douglas county to support the sale, stating that "the funds derived from Easter seals will do much to assist the physically handicapped persons of the state, adults as well as children."

Thousands of crippled children and adults in Oregon need the help from Easter seals because they are not eligible for assistance from any other agency, public or private," Rosenbaum said. "The society is not interested in whether a child or adult's condition is the result of an accident or any one of more than 200 crippling diseases, but only in whether the person needs assistance and cannot obtain it," the president explained.
