

Drain Wins North Half Hoop Title

Holy Cross Crusaders Post 22nd Straight Win, Strive To Set New Victory Record

NEW YORK, Feb. 20 — (AP) — Unbeaten Holy Cross, the nation's No. 1 college basketball power, is the first team in more than 10 years to roll up 22 straight victories.

Not since 1939 has any team gone through its first 22 games without a setback. In that season, Long Island university recorded 24 consecutive triumphs without a defeat, a mark Holy Cross can tie by downing Boston college tonight and Brown next Saturday.

The Crusaders, top-ranking quintet in the Associated Press poll, also can be the first major team in six years to finish with a spotless record. Army's 1944 squad (15-0) was the last to turn the elusive trick, according to figures of the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau.

Boston Tough
However, Boston college figures to be tough for Holy Cross. The Eagles, though sporting an unimpressive 10-4 record, upset highly regarded Villanova Saturday and now are out to avenge an early-season 93-48 shellacking by Holy Cross.

Other games on the Crusader schedule include Valparaiso, New York AC, Columbia and Yale. The last three are road games.

Meanwhile, several conference races across the country are tightening to a bursting point.

St. Louis and Bradley play a return engagement at Peoria, Ill., tonight with the coveted Missouri valley title hanging in the balance. Each club has an identical 8-1 league mark. Bradley, ranked second nationally, beat the Billikens, 54-45, last month at St. Louis.

The southeastern title comes up for grabs Saturday night at Lexington, Ky., where Kentucky shooting for a fourth straight crown, entertains Vanderbilt. Vandy has an 11-2 league mark, Kentucky 10-2.

Ohio State, with six successive league victories, appears to have

the Big 10 flat clinched. Wisconsin has a 6-2 loop figure.

Big Seven Close

The Big Seven race—a four-team squabble among Kansas State, Nebraska, Kansas and Colorado—should go right down to the wire. Arkansas holds a slim edge over four rivals in the southwest race while Princeton, which has an overall 8-9 record, continues to sizzle in the Ivy league. The Tigers rocketed to the top of the league with a 44-42 upset over Cornell Saturday for a 6-1 loop record.

It's tournament time in the Southern conference with North Carolina State, the defending champion for a third straight year, favored to clean up.

In the West, Wyoming is a step ahead of Denver in the Skyline Six chase. The Cowboys have won 10 league games while losing three. Denver is 10-4.

Washington State (10-4) controls the northern division of the Pacific Coast conference while UCLA (7-1) rules the southern sector.

Montana State, with a 9-1 slate, heads the Rocky Mountain conference and Arizona, unbeaten through 11 contests, is a walkover in the border circuit.

Playoff Set At Yoncalla Feb. 24, 25

Precision and teamwork added up to the north half championship for the Drain Warriors, who rolled over Glide high school 64-34 in the final clash of the north Douglas tournament Saturday night at Drain.

In a preliminary game, featuring consolation contestants, Yoncalla bowed 31-26 to Miles Aubin's Oakland Oaks.

The championship tilt, watched by a capacity crowd, featured a smooth operating crew under Coach Bill Chatham and an aggressive but somewhat ragged Wildcat club.

Les Wright's Gliders blew up in the test tilt, after displaying one of the best improved clubs of the regular season.

The strain of championship play seemed to tell on the black-suited Wildcats who were off on their shooting and lacked finesse in the set-ups. On the other hand, the Drain club displayed near-faultless timing and their shooting was invincible.

Both sides brought down the wrath of the officials for the usual infractions, especially due to close checking.

Glide's offense centered around high-scoring Raymond Helms, who posted seven points, and John Finnie, with eight counters.

The Drain high-scoringers included Bob Cellers, with an astronomical 22 points, Jerry Cade, with 16 and Don Joslyn, with 11.

Drain took the initial lead on a side shot by Don Joslyn, with 39 seconds gone, then Helms of Glide copped a free throw. Scoring was fairly evenly distributed in the first quarter, with Drain leading 15-11, but after that, Cellers and Cade started plopping the ball in from all sides and Drain's margin at the half was increased to 35-22.

In the preliminary game, Yoncalla enjoyed a 8-7 lead at the quarter, then Oakland tied it up at 11-all in the second period, went ahead and never was seriously threatened after that.

Strangely enough, Oakland didn't score a single point in the third quarter.

Don Hill and Bob Roberson were Oakland kinsmen, scoring 11 and nine respectively.

UCLA, WSC Lead Coast Basketball

Oregon Drops Idaho To Cellar; Cougars Run Over Washington

It looked pretty much today as if Washington State and UCLA were heading for a smashup to decide the Pacific Coast conference basketball crown.

Washington State virtually sewed up the northern division title Saturday night in taking its second straight from Washington by a 60-42 count.

It put the Cougars a full game and a half in front of Oregon State and knocked the Huskies out of the title picture completely. WSC has but two games remaining on its schedule, both with Idaho which returned to the cellar off its 54-43 loss to Oregon Saturday.

Oregon State with four games remaining must meet Washington twice in Seattle and play a home and home set with Oregon. The Oregon tilt comes the Friday—Corvallis—and Saturday at Eugene.

Down in the south as the field of four pounds toward the wire only USC's Trojans have a chance to collar UCLA's high stepping Bruins.

With only four games to go, UCLA boasts a 7-1 record as compared with USC's 6-2. Both the leaders face Stanford and California on foreign floors this weekend.

USC faces Cal at Berkeley Friday and Stanford Saturday at Palo Alto. UCLA reverses the procedure.

Washington just couldn't cope with Washington State's accuracy Saturday night, nor with the defensive strength of the Cougars.

Gib Gene Conley, Bob Gambold and Ed Gayda controlled both backboards and the Huskies, unable to penetrate the WSC wall, had to fire from way out. The halftime count was 31-21.

Gayda, who was closing out his collegiate career as far as the Washington pavilion is concerned, played one of his better games. He tallied 24 points, 10 more than Washington's Capt. La Don Henson, and held the Huskies' sniper, Frank Guinness, to a single bucket although the Vancouver sophomore tagged three others when scoring assignments were switched.

It was a different kind of game at Eugene where Oregon opened strong, then fell back to a 31-28 halftime deficit and had to fight its way out in the second period.

Trailing 34-30 with a minute gone of the second period, Oregon's Will Urgan opened the Duck surge with a free throw. After Jack Keller bucketed a two-pointer, Urban hooked another to put Oregon out in front, and added still another for an untethered lead.

Urban bagged 18 points for the night's scoring honors, eight more than Idaho's Nick Stallworth. Duck Mel Krouse netted 14.

Idaho hosts Washington this weekend at Moscow while WSC meets the Gonzaga independents

According to north half rules, the Oaks may challenge Glide for a playoff game, to determine the second place north half participant in the all-county tourney, dated for Friday and Saturday night at Yoncalla.
