

Norwegian Ski Star Wins Titles

Undaunted by a wet crust that hampered run-ins, Kristian Moen of Norway jumped his way to two northwest ski titles on the snow-covered slopes of Mount Spokane over the weekend.

Moen, who finished first in Saturday's Esmeralda open with leaps of 238 and 199 feet, hurtled through the air for 211 and 226 feet yesterday to nose out his fellow countryman, Art Tokle, for the Pacific Northwest Ski association class A crown.

Tokle, who garnered 217.2 points on leaps of 219 and 224 feet, was only six-tenths of a point behind Moen.

In the Esmeralda, Moen counted 206.5 points to edge out Gustav Raam, a Norwegian exchange student at the University of Washington. Raam picked up 205.1 points on jumps of 236 and 203 feet.

Tokle was third in the Esmeralda event.

The double-barreled tourney from the 300-foot Mount Spokane hill topped the weekend attractions.

In other events around the Northwest:

Washington state nosed out the University of Washington 390-388 in the annual northern division meet at Emida, Idaho. Idaho was third with 346 points, followed by Montana 324 and Oregon State 249.

Lars Forland and Allen Fisher, both of WSC, nosed out OSC's Bill Bowes for first and second in the slalom Saturday. Bowes finished sixth in the giant slalom won by Washington's Gene Brady.

At Spout Springs, Ore., Jim and Louis Whitacker of Stevens Pass teamed to win the Pacific Northwest Ski association's champion ship first aid toboggan races, taking home the perpetual trophy for combined points and separate awards for top work in first aid.

The Mount Hood team of Bob Bigham and Gene Davis won the toboggan handling competition with the Tollgate area team of Bob Freeman and Bill Van Atta, both of Walla Walla, taking second. Val Quodbach and Worth Kendrick, Mount St. Helens, was second in the overall competition.

Duck Swimmer Breaks Records

Joe Nishimoto, Hawaiian-born swimmer now performing for the University of Oregon, continued his record-breaking performances Saturday as the Ducks swamped Oregon State 55-29 for the second time this year.

Washington, meanwhile, gathered in all first places to wallop Idaho 60-22 for its 21st straight dual meet triumph. The Washington Frosh also garnered all the firsts in dumping Western Washington 59-16.

Nishimoto broke two Oregon freestyle records, stroking the 220 in 2:14 minutes and the 440 in 4:59.4. The old standards, both set by Jack Robinson in 1942, were 2:18 and 5:06 respectively.

Washington bettered five meet records and one division mark, the latter being William Van Smith's 1:02.3 time in the 150-yard individual medley. It was 3-10ths of a second faster than the old standard.

Hoppe, Mosconi Still Rule Billiard World

CHICAGO, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Willie Hoppe, the perennial world champion, and Willie Mosconi still rule the cue ranks.

They were forced into playoffs last night before nailing down their world billiard titles.

The 62-year-old Hoppe retained his three-cushion crown with a 50-28 win in 58 innings over Joe Chamaco of Mexico City.

Hoppe had to defeat the gifted Mexican, survivor of a 1945 bus crash that almost cost him his right arm, twice in succession.

Earlier last night, Hoppe downed Chamaco 50-33 in 48 innings. This tied the pair with five wins and one loss apiece, forcing a playoff.

Ashland Shades Papoose Players

In a fast, rough, but well played game, Ashland nosed out the Roseburg ninth grade Papooses, 38-33 Saturday night at the junior high school gymnasium. Al Hoffman's seventh graders won their game, too, out Eddy Wyatt's eighth graders also dropped one to the Ashland boys.

At no time was there more than five points difference in the ninth grade scoring. Roseburg led 11-8, 21-20 and 24-23 at the end of the first three quarters, but the loss of three Papoose players on fouls, in the last quarter, cost Roseburg the game.

Backen led both teams, with 15 points. Jeffries of Ashland was next with 11. The Papooses go to Cottage Grove next Saturday.

Lumber 'Bootleggers' Get Rough Treatment

ASTORIA, — (AP) — Lumber "bootleggers" who cut trees from Clatsop county land get rough treatment here.

They can keep the timber—but they have to buy it from the county at auction, and lose the money they put into cutting it.

The latest case involves 1,500,000 board feet of hemlock and spruce, which the county said was cut by two trespassers and their crews from public lands. The lumber will go on auction, with the price going into county coffers.

The county timber office said it is so difficult to prove that trespassers have deliberately crossed from private to public land, that it does not attempt to prosecute such cases. Instead, the entire timber cut is sold at auction by the county—to the trespasser or to any lumber firm that wants to buy it.

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New York Acts Against Bowling Congress Rule

NEW YORK — (AP) — State Supreme Court Justice Benedict Dineen has ordered the American Bowling congress to show cause today why it cannot answer charges that it discriminates against Negroes.

The order was signed after State Attorney General Nathaniel I. Goldstein accused the ABC of stalling.

Goldstein brought the discrimination charges against the bowling congress last Jan. 17, and asked an injunction barring the organization's activities in the state.

PORTLAND, Feb. 18 — (AP) — A small boy riding a tricycle in the street near his southeast Portland home was killed Friday when hit by a lumber truck.
