Plywood Quintet Defeats Jaycees In YMCA League

Umpqua Plywood finally did it to the Jaycees, by a 36-27 score at the Roseburg armory last night, in YMCA league play.

It was the first defeat suffered by the Jaycees in six games straight. The last time the Jaycees lost was also to the Plywood five.

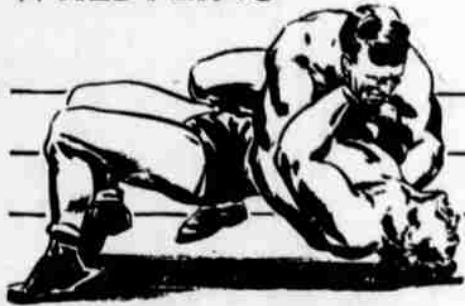

Indians Play Vital Contest Here Tonight

The Douglas division sub-district tournament opened with a bang last night at senior high school, and before the evening ended, it was apparent that Reedsport would be "the team to beat," with Siuslaw running a close second.

The Siuslaw hoopers ran away from Myrtle Creek shortly after the starting gun and won in a breeze by a substantial 54-13 margin.

Reedsport had a tougher time getting started, with Orrin Hills' Bulldogs hanging on for dear life in the first quarter, in fact tied it up at half once, but after that the Norm Olson coached Braves ran away, never to return; won 56-40.

Tonight, Jack Newby's varsity Indians clash with Siuslaw and Sutherlin meets Myrtle Creek.

The Sutherlin-Reedsport tilt was a hailgame, final score notwithstanding. Merle Buck supplied the necessary spark that kept the Bulldogs fire alive. His 17-point total was the highest of the game, and only one under that of Elden Nordahl, little greased lightning on the Siuslaw team.

The Brave combination of Jack Pinion, Dick Froman, Duane Leggett and Chet Perry was something the Bulldogs could not match. The four accumulated 47 of Reedsport's 56 points.

Fred Kroush, in addition to supplying seven points for the Bulldogs, did an outstanding job under the backboards, fighting off a horde of brave hoopers.

As the seconds ticked off, the Brave-Bulldog clash increased in tempo, becoming, at times, a wrestling match of arms and legs, with possession of the ball the aim. The halftime put Reedsport ahead 34-21, following a slim 11-7 lead at the quarter.

The Siuslaw-Myrtle Creek tussle, featuring two sets of Vikings on the floor, both teams having that nickname, was interesting from the standpoint of uncovering to Douglas county fans along highway 99, a formerly unknown team.

The Siuslaw Vikings, who play in a tough league made up primarily of Lane county clubs, feature a diminutive forward and an elongated center that know a basket is for something other than the storage of mending tools.

Forward Elden Nordahl potted 18 points and center Ed Riggs hit for 10 points, to gain high scoring honors for the Siuslans. Nordahl, extremely able, and having the apparent ability to be everywhere at the same instant, thoroughly impressed his opponents and the fans with his handiwork, includes tricky lay-ins from the key.

Don Gillespie sparked the lost cause for Myrtle Creek, with six points. Myrtle Creek got seven of its 13 counters in the first quarter, went scoreless in the second, scored a free throw in the third, then put up what almost appeared to be rally in the closing frame.

From the free-throw line, Myrtle Creek scored three out of 10. Siuslaw made six out of 13. Sutherlin made eight out of 13 and Reedsport made 18 out of 27.

Gonzaga Flash Heading Home

SEATTLE, Feb. 22.—(AP)—This is the end of the line for Rich Evans the Gonzaga express.

Friday and Saturday nights he'll wind up his college basketball career against Washington State, and every time he pots a point he'll wreck a record. Evans set an all-time Gonzaga record of 379 points last year and his total for this season now is 435.

But Deadeye Dick still trails Rolie McNair of North Idaho college for the northwest scoring lead and his main object may be to erase McNair's 56-point edge this weekend.

McNair and Evans are the first northwest collegians to hit the 400-point mark, although several others probably will join them before the season ends. Dick Eicher of Eastern Washington college is in third place with 384 and has two more games on the regular schedule. Gene Conley of Washington State has 364 points and four games on the slate.

Conley held comfortably to top spot in the northern division at the end of the week with 201 points in 14 conference games. His veteran teammate, Ed Gayda, followed with 178 and Washington's gunning guard, Frank Guinness and Louis Sparano, were next with 148 and 142, respectively.

Great Atlas, Frankie Stojack To Grapple In Armory Match

The long-awaited meeting between two of the nation's leading junior heavyweight wrestlers, Frankie Stojack and The Great Atlas, will be part of a double main event at the Roseburg armory Saturday night. The two grapplers are in line for a shot at the coast title, held by Al Szasz, and the winner is certain to be rated the No. 1 challenger.

Another one-hour battle will match Andy Truman, San Antonio, and Karl Gray, Milwaukee — a match between wrestlers of equal ability, but lacking only in importance.

Played Football

Stojack, the former Washington State college football and wrestling star who once played for the West in the Shrine grid classic, teamed with Ted Bell in a tag-team event against Paavo Katonen and Bob Cummings in his last local appearance. He was scheduled to meet Atlas, but the ex-Mr. America charged that Stojack's airplane spin is illegal.

The Roseburg Wrestling commission confirmed Matchmaker Elton Owen's opinion that the spin is one of the accepted holds in catch-as-catch-can wrestling and can be employed by Stojack. The Hollywood strong man, who boasts the most colorful and expensive wardrobe of jackets in the mat sport, says he has never met Stojack, but has seen the airplane spin used—and that it is illegal.

Atlas Accepts, Anyway

Atlas accepted the match, however, and announced that he will use a leg hold that will prevent Stojack from clamping on the spin — although his normal hold is a full-nelson. Atlas has not only crippled several opponents with the new leg hold, but has put both Owen and Harry Elliott out of commission with the hold in recent weeks. Because the Stojack-Atlas bout

has been a "must" on the list of Douglas county fans, the Saturday night show is expected to draw a near-capacity crowd, and ringside seat tickets should be reserved early at Powell's.
