

Holy Cross Crusaders Take 26th Straight Hoop Victory

The pressure gets stronger and stronger; nevertheless Holy Cross keeps on winning.
The nation's only unbeaten major college basketball team won its 26th straight game last night by

smacking Boston college, 71-63. It was the Crusaders' 23rd in a row this season; plus a carryover of three from last year.
H.C. goes after No. 27 Saturday night against Brown in Providence, R.I. The last time a college team won 27 in a row occurred six years ago when Army was unbeaten in one 15-game season and then won 12 straight the next year before losing to Pennsylvania.

Boston Led
Boston college, upset winner over Villanova last Saturday, took an early 10-4 edge against Holy Cross subs, but once the regulars took the floor the Crusaders forged into the lead and stayed there. Bob Coxy, Holy Cross star, set a Boston arena record by sinking 14 consecutive free throws, 11 in the second half. In addition he tallied four field goals for a total of 22 points.

The game was the second of a doubleheader. In the opener Columbia, sparked by John Azary's 11-point spree later in the second half, whipped Harvard, 62-52, in an Eastern "ivy" league game.

St. Johns of Brooklyn and LaSalle, ranked sixth and 12th in this week's Associated Press poll, compared to Holy Cross' second, stayed in the running for a post-season tourney bid.

Manhattan Beaten
LaSalle took Manhattan, 65-60, on Frank Commerford's three field goals in the closing minutes and St. John's wiped out an early 21-7 deficit to nick NYU, 66-60.

North Carolina state, ranked ninth, walloped North Carolina, 70-44, to win its fourth straight regular season southern conference championship. To make it official, however, N.C. State must win the conference post-season tournament. Cornell, beaten twice in a row by Princeton, upset Syracuse, 68-

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77 Major League Players Hold Out

NEW YORK, Feb. 22—(AP)—Seventy-seven major leaguers, including such stars as Hal Newhouser, Howie Pollet, Bob Lemon and Vern Stephens, still haven't come to a contract terms with their employers. Many may still be yelling for more dough when spring training begins one week from today.

A survey by the Associated Press showed today that the St. Louis Browns have the most malcontents, 15, while the New York Giants have none, the only club that can claim that distinction.

Newhouser, one of five Detroit Tigers out of the fold, is reported ready to sign. Pollet also reported to be on the verge of submitting Lemon, who won 22 games for the Cleveland Indians last season, is angling for \$35,000. The world champion New York Yankees also are having trouble gathering in their brood. Nine of the bombers are unsigned, including 20-game winner Vic Raschi, catcher Yogi Berra, infielder Bobby Brown and outfielder Dick Wakefield, the importation from Detroit.

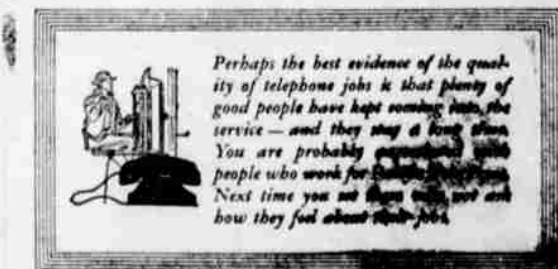
