

Air Raid Warning System To Be On Permanent Basis

PORTLAND, Feb. 27.—(P)—The renewed air raid warning system is being set up on a permanent basis, the national agent of the program said here.

James McCrory, here from Washington to attend the American Legion's regional conference on national security, was reluctant to give details on the network being set up in 21 eastern and four western states.

"After all," he said, "it's the people of Oregon for whom it (the network in Oregon) is being set up. If the people have confidence in us and what we're doing, that's all that's necessary. Naturally, there are certain details which shouldn't be divulged."

However, he gave a general outline, and said the program was planned as permanent since no one knew how long it would be needed. In each locality where there is an observation post the site will be in a house or other building on a hill or with some other observation advantage, he said. It will have a special phone that will flash in the telephone exchange as an emergency signal.

Each governor—or a person designated by him—also will have a special phone over which to get the first flash if there is an impending air raid.

McCrory said the system was tried out last year in 10 northeastern states as "operation lookout." He said it worked smoothly.

Maryla Jonas' Records Popular

Maryla Jonas, celebrated Polish pianist who gives a concert in Roseburg on Thursday, March 2 at 8:15 p.m. at the junior high auditorium under auspices of the Community Concert Association is one of the "best sellers" in the field of recordings. Her Columbia album "Piano Music of Chopin" is in greater demand today than any other Chopin recording according to the latest trade surveys.

Mme. Jonas is now planning the monumental feat of putting all of Chopin's 56 Mazurkas on wax. These will embrace three albums. Recognized as probably the greatest living exponent of the Chopin Mazurka, Mme. Jonas will play six of the mazurkas in her concert program here. As pupil and later the protégé of Paderewski, Jonas started learning the Chopin repertoire when she was 11 years old. Last recorded two years ago for Columbia, the Jonas "Piano of Music of Chopin" has been reissued two times and is now available on new long playing single 12 inch "LP" record.

The New York Times hailed her recording of Schubert Waltzes and Impromptu No. 3 in G. Major as the best piano single of 1947. Miss Jonas' next release, Schumann's "Kinderscenen", Album M. X. 290, is another work which she has made her own. No other pianist quite understands it as she does or projects it with so much tenderness, love and beauty. It is a work which she has played since her ninth year, and every scene, poignantly associated with childhood memories of her own, has taken on a special depth and nostalgia which help make her performance so riveting.

Wiesbaden AFB, Germany — Staff Sergeant John R. Van Keuren, USAF, son of Mrs. Grace Fickes of Sutherland, Ore., recently reenlisted for an indefinite period in the Air Force while serving with the Airways and Air Communications service (AACS) at the Wiesbaden AFB, Germany.

Enlisting in the Air Force in November 1941 the Sergeant served as an instructor in the pilot ground school at the Tonapah air base, Nevada. He later transferred to the Santa Rosa air field, Calif., and from there began his first tour of overseas duty.

Leaving the United States in September 1945 he proceeded to Hickam field, Hawaii, where he was assigned to the AACS as an air operations specialist. After serving at this station for approximately three years he returned to the United States in September 1948 and was assigned to duty in Washington, D. C., where he remained until reassigned to overseas duty in February 1949.
