

UCLA Cinches Playoff Spot; Probable Opponent Is WSC

It will be UCLA and probably Washington State when the northern and southern division winners being playoffs on March 11 for the Pacific Coast conference basketball championship.

UCLA sewed up the southern title by beating Stanford and California last weekend and Washington State has but to win one of its two fourth-round games with Idaho to cop the crown in the northern division.

In fact, the Cougars can get into the playoffs by not winning at all providing second place Oregon State loses one of its games with Washington this Friday and Saturday.

Idaho's Vandals served notice over the weekend, however, that they're going to be no soft touch for the Cougars. Idaho moved into a tie with Washington for third place by defeating the once potent Huskies, 57 to 40, and 48 to 45.

Oregon's Webfoots ended their schedule by beating Oregon State, 45 to 40, on Saturday after losing by 51 to 50 the previous night.

Washington State played a non-league foe, Gonzaga. The Cougars won, 52 to 34, the first night, but bowed, 46 to 43 their next time out.

Meanwhile, UCLA's Bruins dis-

posed of Stanford, 62 to 57 after edging Cal. 46 to 44 the night before. The Bruins have two games remaining. They meet their cross-town rivals, USC, in the UCLA gym on Friday. The teams play in USC territory the next night.

Mel Krause shot Oregon out in front of OSC at 41-40 late in the going and a sterling ball control game kept the victor in hand. Will Urban's 14 points—10 on free throws—paced Oregon while Tommy Homan led OSC with 12 points.

It was a weird tilt that saw Oregon even the four-game series with its traditional rival. OSC didn't score a field goal in the first five minutes and went another five minutes before counting its second, only to surge from an 18-7 deficit to a 25-22 halftime lead.

Grade school competition will enter a third round of play starting next Saturday, after which tentative plans include a tournament, to be played at senior high school.

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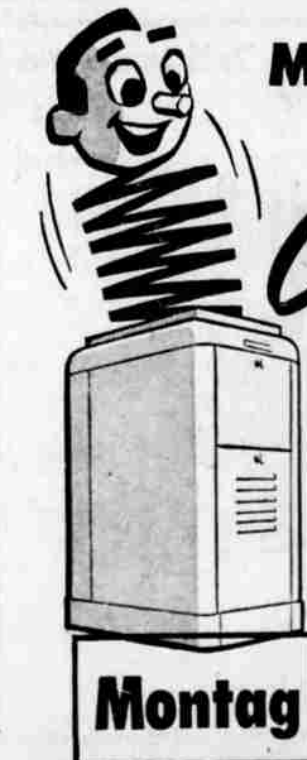

College Tourney Lineups Shaping

The lineups for the big post-season college basketball tournaments began taking shape today with most of the major conference champions lining up with the NCAA event.

The national invitation, with no commitments, has its eyes on not only the conference powers but top ranking independents as well. Holy cross, the country's sole unbeaten major team, is the only club definitely in the title playoffs. The Crusaders, with a 25-0 record will represent district 1 in the NCAA.

Ohio State, which has clinched the Big Ten title with an 18-3 mark, also is headed for the NCAA as a representative of district four.

Kentucky, defending NCAA champion, probably will be back in that competition. Adolph Rupp, the Wildcat coach, has resigned from the district three selection committee to open the way for a tap on the shoulder if the NCAA feels so inclined.

Here are the other likely choices for the eight-team NCAA affair, with eastern playoffs in New York

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March 23-25 and western eliminations in Kansas City March 24-25. District 2-Duquesne; 5-Bradley or Nebraska; 6-Arizona or the south-west champion (Baylor, Arkansas, SMU); 7-Wyoming or Denver; 8-UCLA or Washington State.

Some of these teams are under consideration for bids to the national invitation, a 12-team elimination opening at Madison Square Garden March 11.

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1950 Cars Set Economy Marks in Rugged Run

GRAND CANYON, ARIZONA
—Competing in the world's greatest stock car test, 31 American automobiles, driven by non-professionals, zoomed into this winter-bound resort to set a high average miles per gallon of 22.074 and score new individual car performance and economy records. Maximum legal speeds were observed in the 751-mile, 18½-hour grind.

Sweetstakes winner in the Mobilgas Grand Canyon Economy Run was the Mercury, with a high in ten miles per gallon of 61.27, a miles per gallon figure of 26.524.
