Cigaret Makers Split At Hearing On Tax Slashes

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28. — (AP) — Manufacturers of "economy brands" of cigarettes have asked Congress to cut the taxes on their smokes.

They argued that it was unfair for the government to collect the same amount in taxes on a pack of their cigarettes that it does on a pack of higher-priced cigarettes made by the big-name companies.

Spokesmen for tobacco-growing North Carolina farmers quickly filed a protest. They argued that a consumer shift to lower-priced cigarettes might reduce the price farmers get for their tobacco.

The arguments were made to the House ways and means committee which is considering revisions in the tax laws.

Right now, the federal tax on cigarettes is \$3.50 a thousand, regardless of the selling price of the cigarettes. This works out to seven cents on a pack of 20.

The Associated Tobacco manufacturers, representing practically all cigarette manufacturers except the five largest, urged that the tax on cigarettes selling at retail for 12 cents a package, or less, be cut to \$2.45 a thousand.

On hand to greet the 85 light planes due at Love field this afternoon were some of the things for which Dallas claims fame.

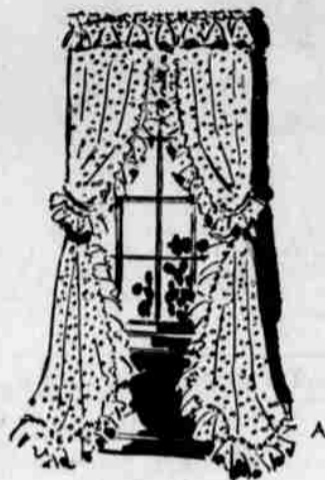
They included beautiful girls, Doak Walker, top-flight cowboys and western-style hospitality.

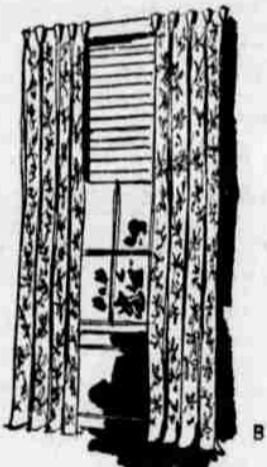

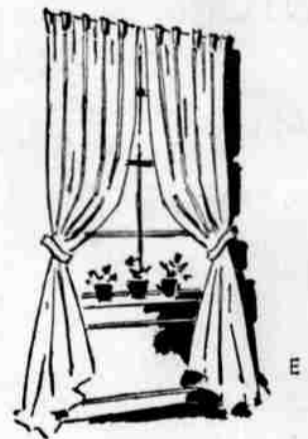
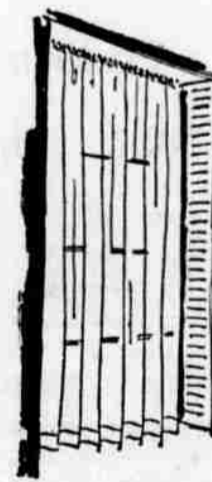
