

### Polish Pianist's Concert Meets Warm Acclaim

Continuous and loud applause from an enthusiastically appreciative audience brought slight smiles to the solemn face of Maryla Jonas, who appeared in a piano concert last night on the stage of the junior high school auditorium.

The largest crowd yet to attend one of the Community Concert series was on hand to hear Miss Jonas present her recital. The famed Polish artist of the piano lived up to her reputation to the letter, and presented perhaps the outstanding performance of a young pianist to appear in Roseburg.

While some of the less versed in classical music might have appreciated a greater variety of selections to include some of the more popular compositions, the ability of Miss Jonas could not be denied. She played with a smoothness that was perfection, and her hands drifted over the keys as seeming effortless.

Those who heard and saw Maryla Jonas will not soon forget her excellent musical performance, her stately appearance, her solemn manner, and her faint smiles of appreciation of the audience's applause.

### Truman Decides To Ask Mines' Seizure Power

(R-VI) also indicated that they might offer a bill. Yesterday's ruling by Federal Judge Richmond Keech that the United Mine Workers union is innocent of contempt of court touched off a round of demands in Congress for federal seizure of the mines.

His bill would provide for federal seizure for up to 60 days under this procedure. The President would be required to make recommendations to Congress for settling the dispute. If he recommended seizure, it would become effective in five days unless both the Senate and the House vetoed the idea in the meantime.

During the seizure period the government could not change pay rates or working conditions in the mines. Terms of the contract which expired last June 30 probably would prevail.

All income received from the mines would be held in trust for (1) payment of general operating expenses and (2) "just compensation" to the private owners. The balance of income would be paid into the federal treasury.

In offering his measure, Morse said the Taft-Hartley law had proved to be "a flop—a dismal failure." He predicted that if the government took over the mines, the coal diggers would go back to work.

Both the miners and the operators, Morse added, would rise to their patriotic obligations and support the flag that flies over the property.

### Overseas Relief Program Slated For Broadcast

The first program in a new transcribed dramatic series titled "Operation Good Samaritan," will be broadcast Monday at 3:45-4 p.m. on station KRNR as a part of the nation-wide "One Great Hour of Sharing" overseas relief appeal which will take place in more than 100,000 Protestant and Eastern Orthodox churches at 11 a.m. Sunday, March 12.

Operation Good Samaritan and produced by the Protestant Radio Commission tells the story in dramatic form of the needs of people overseas who will benefit from the funds raised by the appeal. "Crisis in Asia," the first program, tells the story of a baby boy born in a trench during the Chinese civil war.

"Men Without a Country" deals with people made stateless by the Potsdam agreement. The final program, "My Name On A Mailbox," is a documentary including the actual voices of displaced persons from camps overseas who find a new home in Indiana and friendship in the hearts of their new neighbors there.

The programs will be heard each afternoon except Saturday at 3:45-4:00 p.m. over station KRNR Saturday from 4-4:15. Nearly 25 million members of 19 major Protestant and Eastern Orthodox denominations are expected to participate in "One Great Hour of Sharing" which will aid the peoples described in the radio programs. The effort is sponsored by 7 interdenominational agencies and is being coordinated by Church World Service.

Tollett, Futive Oakland Bank Robber, Recaptured (Continued from page One) of the Bank of Sweet Home the following Aug. 29. Within a month of the second robbery Tollett was named by the FBI. At that time he was under arrest at Bakersfield, Calif., on an armed robbery charge—he later was convicted—along with Sam Scriver who drew 20 years for his part in the Oakland robbery.

F Tollett was under 25-year sentence for each of the bank robberies when he escaped from McNeil island federal prison last November. The first break in the robberies came with arrest in Oklahoma of Joe Berry Bishop who got a two and a half year sentence and later Henry Clay Green was arrested in Oklahoma (he got six years and four months).

Tollett later led authorities to a Bakersfield cache where \$13,000 was recovered. About \$17,000 was recovered in Oklahoma. The resolution the House group sent to the White House by a 13 to 11 vote Wednesday was aimed primarily at federal security administration Oscar Ewing, who has been sharply criticized by lawmakers in the committee and elsewhere. The committee reportedly was thinking of reconsidering its action when Mr. Truman's letter to Chairman Lesinski (D-Mich) was made public by the White House. The President made clear that he saw no reason for the resolution. The committee's job is to write a bill, he said, adding: "I see no reason why any detailed questions of administrative procedure should delay or impede the committee."

### Visitors Give 'Homey' Touch To Vets At Hospital

The volunteer in the hospital is a "little bit of fresh air from the outside" to the patients, the connecting link or liaison officer between the hospital and the community, Miss Ruth S. Bloom, chief nurse at the Roseburg Veterans hospital, told members of Rotary Thursday.

Speaking at the club's regular meeting at the Hotel Umpqua, Miss Bloom emphasized the importance of the "homey touch" which the volunteer worker can bring to patients—something the staff often doesn't have time to give. Though the regular attendants, nurses and so forth often reek with "hospital," the volunteer worker brings in the outside touch, by many little services, such as a pack of cigarettes or writing a letter for a patient.

The volunteer, "one who enters into or offers himself for," any service of his own free will," according to Webster, is very much appreciated by the staff of the Veterans hospital, nurse bloom said. "They very often can encourage him (the patient) to want to get better quicker and to return to normal life," she added.

A lack of men volunteers and visitors was noted by Miss Bloom, although there are usually enough woman volunteers. Visitors are encouraged to see the local establishment, a neuro-psychiatric hospital, and know for themselves what the situation is, she told the assembled club members. Go there and take out an "education" of neuro-psychiatric treatment—so everyone will know more of what is to be done to keep one out of every seven persons in the U.S. out of such hospitals. "Don't worry, they aren't a bunch of screaming people at the hospital. Many of them are more stable than those of us outside. Come out and see us," she concluded.
