Approximately 80 percent of residents residing in the Yoncalla area or a total of 650 persons, receive chest X-rays during the one-day stay in that community Wednesday, reported Mrs. W. F. Amiot, Douglas County Tuberculosis and Health association executive secretary.

The unit moved to Sutherland Thursday, and will remain open tonight until 8 o'clock. The schedule for this unit for next week follows: Sutherland scout hall 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. Monday and Tuesday; at Riddle gulf hall Wednesday, Mar. 8 from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m., and Thursday, Mar. 9, from 9 a. m. to 12 noon, at the same location, then moving to Harbor Plywood the same day for a stay from 1:30 to 5:30 p. m. The unit returns to Roseburg Friday, Mar. 10, and will be set up at the high school from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m.

Approximately 800 persons were X-rayed in a three-day stay of the state mobile unit at Drain. This unit moved to Oakland, and will remain open tonight at the Veterans Memorial building until 8 p. m. The unit remains at Oakland and will be open Monday, Mar. 6, from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m., going then to Canyonville Tuesday, Mar. 7, between the hours of 10 a. m. and 6 p. m., and then to Days Creek Wednesday, Mar. 8, from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m., and Thursday, Mar. 9, from 12 noon to 8 p. m. at the Days Creek school.

"Tick's" Tips On
Veterans Hospital

Here is the scoop promised on the Kinney operation: They say shoemakers' children always are barefooted and that doctors never take their own medicine, but that doesn't always hold true as observed at the Veterans hospital last week when Dr. Kenneth Kinney submitted to an operation in his own hospital.

Dr. Kinney, as all of his Roseburg friends know, is the chief of professional services and that means that he is the doctor in charge of the direct care and treatment of patients at the institution. When the man in charge of treatment consents to being operated on by his own hospital staff and to being treated there, it looks as though he felt good about the type of work done there.

We have the word of Dr. N. M. Webster, chief of surgery, that, as always, doctors are unusual patients. Dr. Webster stated, "It is usual when operating upon a doctor, or a member of a doctor's family, to anticipate the unusual, however, in this particular case the unusual which was anticipated was found and, to make matters more interesting, a bizarre, pathological process and an anatomical variation reported to be found only ONCE in EIGHT THOUSAND individuals operated upon for a similar condition was brought to light."

This probably, as was explained to me by the good Dr. Webster, was the result of a delayed fuse in Dr. Kinney which allowed him to neglect this situation he has had until he had sufficient distress and bellyaches to ask for help. It is of interest to know that the operation necessary to correct the type of difficulty present with Dr. Kinney was only devised about three years ago. Therefore, Dr. Kinney's procrastination was his best friend and his bellyaches very kindly waited until a procedure was available for the adequate correction.

Dr. Kinney has been at the hospital for over 12 years and is well known to Roseburg as an old resident here, but as a matter of fact was originally from Astoria. He is now convalescing from his operation at his place down in Goose Bay area, but promises that he won't chop down trees or do any digging of claims for a week or so. He says the only thing he can't understand is why he put up with a bellyache as long as he did, when Dr. Webster could have fixed it up before. Dr. Webster, plus Drs. Anderson and Krings all agree that for a doctor he wasn't too bad a patient, and that's a compliment.

The Easter morning sunrise service, to be held for the patients of the hospital and citizens of Roseburg on the hospital grounds near The Grove is fast developing into fruition. The committee in charge of the program headed by Chaplain Feller is developing plans suitable for the occasion and comparable to the Christmas Nativity activity. Also, a program for the morning is being developed that will be inspiring and will be long remembered by those who attend this service.

The Roseburg Choral society will sing and an Easter message will be brought by one of Roseburg's ministers. There will be parking area for all who come. In the event of rain—the service will be held in the recreation building auditorium.

It was good to sit in on a Rotary club meeting. As Doctor John Haskin's guest Thursday noon this writer not only had his first meal

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away from a hospital since August 9th but he had the pleasure of hearing Ruth Bloom, chief nurse, appeal to a group of business and professional men to come out to the Veterans hospital and do the "niceties" for neurotic patients that the staff is unable to do itself. Merle Pugh of the News-Review staff has given the meeting a full report. As a patient, who has lived with the Bamboos, Greybeards and Kids the importance of her message is fully recognized. As a charter member of the Astoria Rotary club and as an active member for 15 years in that sea coast town many speeches and programs were listened to. Without handing our readers any "malarkey" Miss Bloom's straight talk today was the best to hit this Greybeard's ear.
