Reapportionment Plan Backed By Farm Bureau

SALEM, March 4.—(P)—The Oregon Farm Bureau federation has lined up behind the reapportionment amendment to the state Constitution which is proposed by Young Republicans.

Marshall Swearingin, federation vice president, said a majority of county farm bureaus favored the so-called "balanced representation" plan. He said bureau members would begin circulating petitions to get the plan on the November ballot.

The Farm Bureau convention at La Grande late last year had favored a reapportioning proposal by State Rep. Giles French. This would have apportioned the legislature on the federal plan. No filing for it has been made.
