

### Lady Godiva Not For Book-Ends

COVENTRY, Eng. — (AP) — Make lovely Lady Godiva into a set of nude book-ends? Not even to earn dollars.

So says sculptor Sir William Reid Dick and that seems to be final.

An American novelty firm made the proposal to the Coventry city council. It offered to buy the right to reproduce in miniature the life-sized Godiva and horse executed by Sir William for W. H. Bassett-Green, a retired builder, who gave it to the city last year.

The council was divided. Some said the miniatures would impair the value of the pretty lady, clad only in her flowing tresses, at a lure for U. S. tourists in England. The others viewed it simply as an easy way for Britain to make a buck and ease the dollar gap.

Sir William had the last word. He told newsmen:

"I hold the copyright. I don't agree with the idea of cheap replicas and I won't have it."

Name of the U. S. firm was not disclosed.

### Governor McKay Files Candidacy For Reelection

SALEM, March 6 — (AP) — Gov. Douglas McKay formally announced his candidacy for reelection Saturday.

The Republican governor, elected to fill the unexpired term of the late Earl Snell, cited "sound financing" as the chief problem ahead for Oregon.

"The budget is balanced without an increase of state income or property taxes," said McKay in his announcement. "The long delayed building programs for state institutions and higher education are well underway. A long range highway program has been adopted and started on a pay-as-you-go basis."

"The many interests concerned with conservation and development of natural resources have been brought together for the development of a joint and comprehensive program. Proposals for reorganization for state government to achieve economy and better public service are being developed for presentation to the 1951 legislature."

"The problems for the next four years will be among the most difficult in the history of the state. Principal of these is sound financing. It must now have the focus of our attention and effort."

"I again invite support and aid of the earnest and sincere citizens of the state who wish a business-like and practical approach to the problems of the next four years."

### New Contract Sends Miners Back To Pits

The soft coal diggers in the four-week strike, although their contract also had expired last June 30.

The bituminous contract runs until June 30, 1952. But it may be canceled by either party on or after April 1, 1951, upon 30 days' notice.

It provides for: A \$14.75 daily wage, an increase of 79 cents. Lewis had asked 90 cents.

A 30-cent levy on each ton of coal to finance the UMW welfare fund. The pension payment formerly was 20 cents. Lewis had asked 25 cents.

The additional 10 cents a ton in welfare benefits adds up to 70 cents a day for each miner on the basis of an average production of seven tons a day per man.

A union shop, subject to court ruling on its legality.

An end to the "able and willing to work" clause under which miners have stopped work with impunity.

A limit of five days a year on the miners' "memorial" or mourning periods.

Most operators here predicted the soft coal contract would push up the cost of producing a ton by 25 to 35 cents. Some said the public may pay as much as 50 cents a ton more, if operators are to recoup their losses of the last eight months.

"If we produce 600,000,000 tons of coal this year, the contract will cost the country \$300,000,000," forecast Joseph E. Moody, chief negotiator for the Southern Coal Producers association.

UMW men were frankly exultant. Said one: "We won everything except what the courts said we couldn't have."

In the latter category were the union shop, with arrangement for requiring all workers to be unionists is made subject to a case now pending before the supreme court; the "able and willing" clause; unlimited "memorial" periods; and the granting of pensions to UMW members only.

All four have been held to be probable violations of the Taft-Hartley act, pending a hearing by the National Labor Relations board. Lewis was blocked by court order from any strike or slowdown to bring about a renewal of those four clauses.

The settlement ended any chance for passage of the mine seizure bill sent to Congress on Friday by the president.

The White House served notice, however, that Mr. Truman still wants a commission created to study the fading, strife-ridden industry and recommend a legislative cure. Key lawmakers on Capitol Hill have deferred action on the necessary legislation.

TACOMA, March 6 — (AP) — The Weyerhaeuser Timber company has named Arthur O. Karlen of Longview to manage its new branch at North Bend, Ore.

He now is assistant manager of Longview operations. The North Bend mill is under construction. Karlen is scheduled to go there June 1.

Logging operations in the Oregon area already are under way. They are proceeding in the firm's 195,286-acre Millicoma "tree farm" forest in Coos and Douglas counties.

### Crazed Youth Slays 4 Persons, Wounds 3

from hiding, struck from behind and piled up his bloody toll. Other people fled, screaming.

"It seemed like he was using the knife so fast nobody wanted to try to stop him," one witness said. Two policemen in a patrol car finally caught up with the killer. Jones lunged at them with his bloody knife, but they beat it out of his hand and slugged him to the sidewalk with gun butts. Then they tied him up with rope and carried him off in their car.

Strong as a bull, though short and slim, he burst into such violence at Brooklyn police headquarters that it took six policemen to lash him to a chair.

He just stared dully straight ahead, wouldn't talk, and wouldn't acknowledge his weeping mother who was brought in. He was put in a straitjacket and taken to a hospital. Police booked him on homicide charges.

**Slaying Oray Told**  
A few minutes after Jones had wounded his first victim, Joseph Bondolato, 25, police were on his trail. He came upon two young fathers, each with a baby carriage and each bragging about the child inside.

One was James Culhane, 28, a shoe salesman, and the other was Kenneth Kennedy, 23, a Mohawk Indian and construction worker.

Shouting "Do you know me?" Jones plunged the bloody knife into Kennedy's chest. The knife stuck. As Kennedy tried to stagger away, Jones followed and yanked the knife out of his chest.

Kennedy's five-month-old daughter was not molested. The father was in critical condition in a hospital today.

Jones, rearmend, returned to the spot where he had found the two fathers. But Culhane already was on the run, pushing his 15-month-old son.

Culhane heard a familiar sound behind him—"Do you know me?" but he made it to his own house before Jones got within knife range. Four men were in a social club on the first floor, and Culhane called to them: "There's a madman out here!"

The madman had lost interest in Culhane by this time, and took a new course on his bloody route. He ripped Annilio Durso, 61, who died early today.

A few feet farther on, the slayer killed 46-year-old Frank St. George on the spot by plunging the knife into him time and again.

A block away, Jones met a friend, James Vearyns, 20, a Negro, and slashed him on the wrist as he waved.

Doubling back on his route, Jones plunged his knife into John George, 51, killing him, and wounded Jerome Sullivan, 51, so badly he died in a few minutes.

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### Paper Publishes As Strike Faced

PASCO, Wash., March 6 — (AP) — Pickets appeared at the Tri-City Herald News plant this morning as a strike of mechanical employees entered its third day.

The strike was called Friday evening by the International Typographical union and the Pressmen's union after negotiations on a contract and wage increases deadlocked.

The Herald printed a paper for Sunday and publisher Glenn C. Lee announced today's paper will be out on schedule.

The union is asking a 10 per cent raise to \$90 for 38½ hours, two weeks vacation with pay and continuation of the present six paid holidays per year when no work is performed.

The paper offered \$85 for the existing 40-hour week—a raise of \$5—and offered to negotiate the contract. The union rejected the offer.

Approximately 18 employees are affected. Employees of all other departments are at work.

none the less emerged with a position of strength because of the precarious edge of the Laborites over Winston Churchill's resurgent Conservatives.

The Labor party's election program had promised to nationalize the cement, water supply, sugar and food processing industries.

**Harmony Major Aim**  
The main aim of the Laborites now is to steer the government through its budgetary problems in the next few months, and for this reason the king's speech reflected a desire to avoid controversy in the immediate future.

The legislative program laid before the Commons was a sketchy one, touching only upon such legislation as might stir little conflict.

In fact, the king laid most stress on such non-controversial material as the hope for achievement of a solution to the problem of atomic energy control.

Failure to make any reference whatever to nationalization, a program close to the heart of the Labor party, seemed to reflect the party's desire to avoid controversial issues in the immediate future. But harmony will not be sought at the expense of the national well-being, the king said.

The king paid tribute to the "generous help" given Britain by the United States, Canada and other British commonwealth nations. He also praised the "sustained endeavor" of the British people in increasing industrial and agricultural production.

The British, the king said, "will play their due part in collaboration with other powers in strengthening the common means of defense."
