

Drain Wins District Hoop Title, Will Enter State B Tourney At Astoria

Glendale Pirates Quelled By Warrior Club, 46-43

The Drain Warriors copped the Douglas-Cook-Cary district crown with a 46-43 edge over the Glendale Pirates at Yoncalla Saturday night; thereby winning the right to represent this area at the state B tourney, to be played at Astoria March 9-11.

In a preliminary consolation game, Powers rolled over Gold Beach 46-40, with Powers' center Don Hull leading in scoring on 19 counters.

The championship contest was a battle from the word "go" and a standing room only crowd saw Glendale take an early lead, to go ahead 10-5 at the end of the first quarter.

But Drain, paced by big scoring guns Jerry Cade, with 21; and Don Joslyn, with 12, soon narrowed the gap—and the halftime saw the Glendale and Drain teams even-step at 19-19.

Glendale again went ahead after the half, but Bill Chatham's Warriors caught up and retained the lead just prior to the end of the third quarter.

The outcome, still in doubt, had the standees waiting until the final instant before departing, as Drain took the ball following officials' time and stalled out for the balance of the game.

John Harbour, not nearly as "hot" as he was Friday night, scored 12 points for the losers, with Mouchette taking second place honors for Glendale with 10 points.

In the early contest, Powers was afe all the way, with Hull, Brady and Boutin doing most of the scoring. A nip-and-tuck battle at times, Powers led only 22-21 at the half.

Atlas came back to win the second with body slams and a full nelson. Referee Owen had more trouble with Atlas in the final, and finally ended up awarding the match to Stojack.

Washington State To Oppose UCLA In Coast Title Playoff Friday Night

Washington State's vaunted basketballers are scheduled to board a plane this Thursday for their Friday night date at the Pacific Coast conference championship playoffs in Los Angeles.

The UCLA Bruins will comprise the other half of this north-south arrangement for the second year in a row. Last season, UCLA won the southern division title, but succumbed to Oregon State in the playoffs.

The winner of this weekend's best two-of-three series, which will be decided Monday if the teams split, will go to Kansas City for the western regional NCAA playoffs.

The Cougars are expected to land in Los Angeles Friday morning. They'll come in with a troupe of seasoned campaigners headed by veteran forward Ed Gayda, one of the top scorers in the conference.

The outcome of the series, billed at the UCLA gym, will probably hinge on Washington State's ability to keep up with the Bruins' brand of high gear, breakneck attack.

The tournament will be at Eugene next week.

Marshfield overcame Siuslaw, 80-55, for the district 3-A crown and a tourney berth Saturday night. Hillsboro, reigning its earlier upset by the upstart school of Banks, dumped Banks, 45-29, to win the 9-A crown.

Milton-Freewater made it two straight over Hood River, 68-50, for the 2-A crown. Bend defeated Redmond, 44-33, in the 3-A wind-up. Corvallis overcame Sweet Home, 37-29, in the 7-A playoff. La Grande edged past Vale, 54-52, in the 1-A race.

One upset figured in the weekend games in other district playoffs. Dallas dumped favored Newberg, 33-48, to gain the final in 8-A. Dayton defeated Salem Academy, 37-29, for the other role in the final Tuesday night at McMinnville.

Salem clung to its lead in the 11-A playoff by defeating Woodburn, 58-40, in the other game there. Mt. Angel defeated Stayton, 37-18.

The other undecided district champion will be determined tonight when Milwaukie and West Linn meet in the 12-A final.

The ranks of the class B tournament, which opens Thursday at Astoria, began filling up, too.

Monmouth toppled Sublimity, 45-38, to win the 2-B title and a tourney berth. Union overcame Wallowa, 53-50, for the district 8-B crown. Grants Pass beat Illinois Valley, 67-49, in a non-title clash.

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Wildcats Lose Right To Enter NCAA Playoff

Baron Adolph Rupp, the Kentucky Wildcat, is yelling "foul" today but it won't do any good. North Carolina State, not Kentucky, will carry Dixie's colors into the NCAA basketball tournament.

The bluegrass coach wanted to try again for a "grand slam" this year in the NCAA and the national invitation tournament. But he has to settle for just the NIT. Last year the wildcats lost the NIT but won the NCAA.

Rupp accepted the NIT bid last night immediately after Carolina State won the NCAA nod. There were indications the Baron had been using delaying tactics in hopes of also getting into the NCAA. He was a cinch for the NIT.

The Carolinians (24-5) got their invitation from the district three (south) selection committee "because Kentucky declined to meet North Carolina State in a playoff."

Only cage five so far having a chance to win both crowns is Bradley. The Peoria, Ill., Braves are entered in the NIT and will play the Big Seven winner March 20 for the district five bid to the NCAA.

Nine teams are now entered in the 12-club national invitation. The tournament begins Saturday and ends March 18.

Only three of the eight clubs making up the NCAA tournament have been named. They are Holy Cross (26-1), Ohio State (19-3) and North Carolina State (24-5), all in the eastern half.

The eastern half of the NCAA is scheduled for March 23-25, the western half at Kansas City March 24-25 and the title game March 28 at Madison Square Garden.

Entered in the NIT are defending champion San Francisco (19-6), Kentucky (25-4), Long Island U. (20-4), St. John's (22-4), Syracuse (17-7), LaSalle (19-3), Duquesne, (22-3), Bradley (27-3) and Western Kentucky (24-5).
