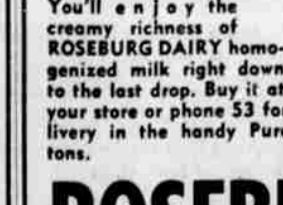

## Estate And Trust Forum To Be Held Here March 10



Typical trust problems which face the majority of American families will be discussed for Roseburg residents at a special estate and trust forum to be held Friday evening, March 10, at the Umpqua hotel in Roseburg, under the sponsorship of the United States National bank, according to Harold E. Schmeer, manager of the bank's Roseburg branch.

Four experienced trust officers from the Portland offices of the bank will conduct the program, which is to be a graphic and non-technical presentation of appropriate methods for dealing with the problems of the average family. The program will include both estate planning and tax economics.

The four-man team of trust experts will be led by R. M. Allen, vice president and head of the trust department of the United States National bank. His associates on the program include trust officers D. W. MacKay, L. B. Staver and E. J. Overman.

Plan Will Be Shown According to letters of announcement written by E. C. Sammons, president, an estate plan will be set up at the meeting, with the visual aid of charts and graphs, explaining the exact procedure followed after a will becomes effective. The discussion will cover methods of minimizing estate taxes and establishing economical management of estate holdings.

R. M. Allen will introduce the discussion, followed by D. W. MacKay who will discuss a typical estate plan. L. B. Staver will explain how the typical plan works, and E. J. Overman will conclude the forum with a discussion of trust investments under present-day conditions. Opportunities will be provided for questions from the audience. Schmeer will act as presiding officer.

The Roseburg program is the ninth presentation of this estate and trust forum by the United States National bank. According to Schmeer, previous forums have received much interest and acclaim. Similar forums will later be held in other Oregon cities.

Persons who have not received direct invitation may, if interested secure reservations at the Roseburg branch of the U. S. National bank.

## Air Raid Warning Test Scheduled In Late Spring

PORTLAND, March 6—(AP)—Oregon's air raid warning network will be ready for a full-scale late spring test and then go into mothballs.

Organization of the volunteer scanning group is "coming very nicely," Louis E. Starr, Oregon director of civilian defense, said. There are many volunteers for the observation posts and filter board work, he said, and the progress in setting up the program indicates it will be ready long before the May 1 deadline set by Secretary of Defense Johnson.

Starr said the secretary's program calls for the network to be established, to have a full-scale test—presumably correlated throughout the west—and then to be put on a stand-by status for call when needed.

It is designed, Starr said, to fill gaps in the coast's radar screen. Other phases of the state's civilian defense program are being worked out even more swiftly, Starr said. The emergency transportation program is completely set up and ready for call; communications facilities have been well organized; the medical program is developing very well and

is already organizing for such things as bacteriological and radiological defense, he said. Starr said the entire program was designed as a permanent safeguard and should not be viewed as occasioned by any specific foreign news developments.
