Rupp fashioned second stringers and new men into a combination that won the Southeastern conference crown and another invitation to a post-season tourney.

ASTORIA, March 10.—(AP)—Drain's Warriors rolled into the second round of the Oregon state high school class B basketball tournament with a 40-to-35 victory over the Wolverines on Monmouth in the first game of the three-day tourney, which opened Thursday afternoon at the Astoria Armory.

Complete ineptness from the free-throw line spelled defeat for Coach John Chamberlain's Wolverines. They fired at the basket from ten charity mark 11 times and 11 times the ball failed to fall through the netting. The Wolverines equaled the Warriors' production of field goals, each team connecting for 18, but Drain sank 4 of 14 from the free-throw stripe and that was the ball game.

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, March 10.—Something unique in northern division basketball history occurred in the Oregon State-Washington series at Seattle last weekend. Although the Beavers dropped both games, 47-45 and 57-54, they outshot the Huskies from the field badly both nights.

In the second contest Oregon State hit a high .413 while Washington was batting only .239. The first night the Beavers batted .325 and the Huskies hit only .241. Inaccuracy on the free throw line cost the Orange both games. Stats Gill's men connected on only 16 out of 32 charity tosses Saturday night and missed eight Friday.

Starving Children Are Aided By Kindly Judge

PHOENIX, Ariz., March 10.—(AP)—Nearly 100 starving children ate their first nourishing meal in many weeks at a migratory workers camp near here Thursday, thanks to a kindly judge.

Food boxes and medicine were sent to the area on orders of Superior Judge Thomas J. Croffie, juvenile court jurist, shortly after the situation was first disclosed.

Judge Croffie said children were found with distended abdomens. A family with six children ranging from 17 months to 11 years said it had been without food for 10 days and a crippled father told investigators he had sold a pint of blood to obtain food for his six children.

A report on the camp, 14 miles west of Phoenix, revealed many other families were subsisting on flour and water biscuits and lard gravy.

Most of the men have been without work for some time. About 100 families live in the area.

QUESTION: I sometimes lend my car to my sister who is an adult and licensed to drive. A friend tells me that if she should have an accident I would be responsible as the owner of the car and that my liability and property damage insurance would not protect me. I'm not sure I'm protected but I'm not sure and I would appreciate it if you would clear this up for me.

ANSWER: Your liability and property damage policy covers you and any other legally responsible person who has your permission to drive the car. So long as you personally lend the car to your sister you are fully protected in any possible resulting accident.

Camp Adair Tract To Be State Game Bird Farm

CORVALLIS.—(AP)—A 1,600-acre tract of the wartime training Camp Adair will be turned into a state game bird farm.

The Eugene game farm will close down after this year's pheasant chicks are distributed. Equipment from that farm will be transferred to the Adair tract, and the Eugene site sold.

Later the Corvallis game farm at Lewisburg may also be moved to Camp Adair.

The State Game commission said the change was to provide ample room for expansion. The Camp Adair farm will be used both to raise pheasants and to conduct field studies on upland game birds.

ROTARIANS KEPT GUESSING

CHICAGO.—(AP)—Members of Rotary clubs are engaged in a guessing game these days. They're trying to figure out how large the organization will be when they celebrate its 50th birthday anniversary in 1955.

Paul Harris and three friends started the club Feb. 23, 1905. They called it Rotary because the early sessions were held in rotation in the offices of members. At latest count, there were 334,000 members and 6,960 clubs in 83 countries.

Alfred Tisch, chairman of Rotary's extension committee, came up with the idea for the guessing game. "We can," he guesses, "have 10,000 clubs and 500,000 members by 1955."

KLAMATH FALLS, March 10.—(AP)—Injuries suffered in the crash of a biplane proved fatal yesterday to Eugene Ackley, 72, Brookings.
