Offers Classes
At Myrtle Creek**

A series of three separate classes are to be offered in Roseburg and Myrtle Creek by the General Extension division.

Starting Saturday, March 11, "History 377, Oregon History," will begin and will continue for seven weekly meetings of three hours each. The class will be held in the Roseburg Junior high school, room 204, from 9 a.m. to 12 noon. This course is required of all teachers who wish to qualify for a regular Oregon certificate, and it grants undergraduate credit.

"Alcohol Studies in the Curriculum, Science Ed. 481," will start Thursday, March 23, and continue for 10 weekly meetings. It will also meet in the Roseburg Junior high school from 7 to 10 p.m. This is a scientific presentation of the alcohol problem and will grant both graduate and undergraduate credit.

A class in "Guidance and Counseling," will begin March 16 and will meet in the library of the Myrtle Creek high school from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. It will grant both graduate and undergraduate credit.
