"Senseless" Money Bills Rapped By Lawmaker

WASHINGTON, March 14.—(AP)—Rep. Kearney (R-N.Y.) is worried over the attitude of the American public toward what he calls "present day, excessive government spending."

"I can only conclude," Kearney said today in an interview, "that most of us, for tolerating such mammoth expenditures, have taken leave of our senses."

The New Yorker said the bills are introduced every day calling for more and more reckless expenditures hardly any of which can be justified in the grounds of common sense.

Senate Votes To Double Bank Deposit Insurance

WASHINGTON, March 14.—(AP)—The Senate Monday passed a bill to provide federal insurance on individual bank deposits up to \$10,000, double the present limit.

The bill now goes to the House.

Under present law, the Federal Deposit Insurance corporation insures individual accounts in covered banks up to a maximum of \$5,000.

Besides raising the insurance coverage to \$10,000, the legislation would indirectly reduce the assessments on insured banks to finance the program.

New Jersey Bans TV Tax On Wrestling, Boxing

TRENTON, N. J., March 14.—(AP)—The grunt and groan boys can continue to do their stuff for New Jersey television fans on a tax-free basis.

A move to impose a 10 percent tax on sale of television, radio and motion picture rights to boxing and wrestling matches was defeated yesterday by the state assembly.

Adoption Of All Hoover Report Urged By Morse

ASHLAND, March 14.—(AP)—Adoption of the entire Hoover commission report on government economy and reorganization was urged here yesterday by Senator Wayne Morse.

The senator said he hoped Republicans would be more specific in urging slashes in federal spending. He said the party has been too vague in its demands.

Daylight Saving Gets Nod Of Eugene Council

EUGENE, March 14.—(AP)—The city council voted last night to adopt daylight saving time here this year from April 30 to September 24. Mayor V. Edwin Johnson cast the deciding vote after a 4-4 tie.

The mayor explained the dates conformed with the daylight time period in California and the approximate dates for its start in other Oregon cities.

WASHINGTON, March 14.—(AP)—Senate approval sent to the White House Monday a bill granting a federal charter to the Girl Scouts of the United States of America. The Senate acted on the 38th birthday of the organization, open to girls from 7 to 17 years of age.

Mrs. Harry S. Truman, wife of the president, was listed in the measure as chief sponsor of the charter.

Prison Terms Given Top Koreans For Red Contacts

SEOUL, Korea, March 14.—(AP)—Thirteen members of the Korean national assembly were sentenced to prison today for terms as long as ten years for violating national security by having contacts with Communists. Two were declared to have admitted they had received money from alleged Communists.

Deficit Spending Assailed By Taft

DEFIANCE, O., March 14.—(AP)—If the government continues to spend more than it takes in, the result could be "completely demoralizing," U. S. Sen. Robert A. Taft (R-Ohio) said last night.

The Ohio senior senator's speech was his third here yesterday.

He said last night:

"Once Congress accepts the policy that it doesn't have to pay back its debts, there is no limit on the extent to which the deficit might be increased. Such a policy would be completely demoralizing for our people because it is based on the impossible premise that you can have something for nothing."

He called permanent deficit spending repudiation of the national debt.

"It is no different than repudiation of (debt by) any person who goes bankrupt," he added. "The government is repudiating the value of the dollar with which its debts are to be paid."

If most of the Hoover commission economy recommendations are adopted and if Americans make up their minds the country "simply is unable to support all the rest of the world," federal spending could be reduced, he suggested.

Grants Pass Woman Killed By Bus Blow

GRANTS PASS, March 14.—(AP)—The first traffic fatality in Josephine county in nearly seven months occurred on Pacific Highway near here last night.

Lola May Sexton, 42, residing in a local hotel, was killed instantly when hit by a West Coast bus as she ran across the road from a disabled automobile.

LEOPARD ON LOOSE

AUCKLAND, New Zealand, March 14.—(AP)—A half grown leopard escaped from the zoo here today and armed police and soldiers hunted in vain for the animal. Residents of an adjacent housing area where there are 200 children were warned to remain indoors.
