Douglas Logging Operations Not Yet On Full Basis

Warmer weather in February enabled most of the sawmills in Douglas county to resume operations after the severe conditions prevalent during January. The logging industry is still more or less dormant. A little activity in this field has been noted, but until the roads in the more remote areas become dry enough, trucks will not be able to operate to get the logs out of the woods.

With the change of weather, the number of orders for workers increased which resulted in a doubling of the number of applicants being referred to jobs. Thirty-seven percent of the resultant placements were in the lumber industry, 27 percent in service occupations and nineteen percent in clerical and sales.

Claims for unemployment insurance have dropped 45 percent. The major portion of these returned to work during the first three weeks of the month. A gradual decrease in claims will follow as work in the woods and construction jobs open up when weather permits.

Construction work in the area should be in full swing by the first of April. Work is expected to start on several school buildings and on the Toketee falls project. These jobs will provide work for a great number of men which will aid materially in alleviating the current unemployment condition.

A survey of the agricultural prospects for the season reveals that crops in the ground suffered no ill effects from the cool weather. An estimate of fruit and nut crops can not be made until after blossom time, but all indications are that a good year should be forthcoming.

Two-World Pact With U. S. Said Aim Of Russia

NEW YORK, March 14 —(AP)—The New York Times reported Monday that United States officials believe the Soviet union now is making a new effort to arrange a "spheres of influence" deals with this country.

A Washington dispatch by James Reston said:

"Recent events in the communist world suggest to experts in official quarters here (in Washington) that the Soviet union is trying to do two things:

"1. Minimize or eliminate western influence in all Communist satellite states.

"2. Arrange a two-world settlement with the United States under which the Western nations would adopt a hands-off policy throughout the whole Communist world, including China and Yugoslavia, and do most of their business with the Soviet satellites through Moscow."

The story said:

"Pressure on the United States, Britain and France to reduce their missions or get out of the satellite states, combined with official statements that the worlds of capitalism and communism can live in peace on a non-intervention basis, are the characteristics of almost all recent statements or actions in the communist states."

The Times reported that recently "Moscow's attitude toward western officials in the Soviet capital is more correct."

It is noted in Washington, the story said, that "there has been some relaxation on travel for foreign diplomats in the Soviet union of late, and United States reporters are now able to say more and say it quicker than in some months."

Religious Census Will Be Taken Soon In Riddle

Rev. Sam P. Neufeldt, pastor of the First Baptist church in Riddle, recently attended a pastor's meeting in Cottage Grove, where Dr. Charles Durden, who is conducting a school of missions, spoke.

Dr. Durden, town and country director of the American Baptist Home Mission society of Oregon, will be in Riddle shortly to conduct a canvass of homes in that vicinity. Information will be solicited on family church preferences following Sunday services of the First Baptist church on April 2.

Dr. Durden comes well qualified for this work, having been a national director for Christian teaching missions. He will meet with volunteer workers March 24 at 7:30 p. m. to outline the campaign.

Naval Reserve Promotion Boards Set Meet Dates

The Bureau of Naval Personnel recently announced the schedule for the 1950 selection boards to recommend Naval Reserve officers for promotions to the grades of captain, commander, lieutenant-commander and lieutenant. Four line boards and 20 staff corps boards will be convened.

Approximately 52,000 reserve officers are eligible to be considered for promotion. Naval Reserve officers on extended active duty under the regular Navy appropriation are not considered by the Reserve boards, but are considered for promotion along with their regular Navy contemporaries.

The first 1950 boards will convene on June 5, with the last boards scheduled to meet on Aug. 28. The schedule is: for promotion to captain of the line and medical, dental, chaplain and civil engineer corps June 5; for promotion to lieutenant of the line June 5; for promotion to commander of the line and all staff corps June 19; for promotion to lieutenant-

commander of the line and all staff corps July 24; for promotion to lieutenant, all staff corps Aug. 28.

Officers residing in the Northwest who are selected for promotion will be notified by the commandant, 13th Naval district.
