Luke Sewell is the manager in this Cincinnati new deal. It's the same Luke who won a measure of fame by leading the St. Louis Browns out of the wilderness to their first and only pennant in 1944.

Ho Hum—Mikan Sets Another Score Record

NEW YORK, March 14.—(AP)—Almost every season George Mikan sets some sort of basketball scoring record. This year is no different—the talented Minneapolis Laker center already has written three new pro marks into the books of the National Basketball association. The six-foot-ten Mikan, with 1,801 points in 68 games, is the greatest scorer in the history of hoops for one season. His 625 field goals and 331 fouls also are all-time top figures. Mikan has one game to play.
