

February Drier Than Average

February was a little drier than average according to the latest monthly report from the U. S. Weather bureau station at Roseburg.

Statistics show the average temperature for the month was 45.5, which is 2.1 above normal. The coldest day was Feb. 1 when a 17-degree temperature was recorded, and the warmest day was a spring-like 70 on Feb. 25. Maximum average was 53.7 and the minimum average was 37.3.

Looking at the rainy side of the ledger again, records show Roseburg had only 2.84 inches during the month. This is 1.65 under the normal amount. The greatest amount in 24 hours was .48 inch on Feb. 8-9.

But, despite the dearth of rain, there were 23 cloudy days during the month, three partly cloudy and two clear.

The greatest snow depth was four inches on Feb. 1. There were 10 days during the month in which there was no precipitation or only a trace.

Bigamist Kills Himself; One Wife Found Slain

SALISBURY, Md., March 15.—(AP)—Shots fired about 100 miles and a week apart snuffed out the lives of a well-to-do dairy owner and one of his two wives.

Russell C. Moore, 48, shot himself in a large home he maintained in Collingswood, N. J., yesterday as police approached to question him about the slaying of Marjorie Mae Mahnke Moore, 29, in Salisbury.

Just four hours before, her body had been found in the home she, Moore and their four-year-old daughter occupied in Salisbury.

Moore and his daughter, Marilyn, apparently left the house sometime Monday.

They went to his home in Collingswood about the same time his New Jersey wife, Mrs. Laura Moore, came to Salisbury to look for him.

Mrs. Laura Moore said she came here Monday because she had not heard from her husband for some time and got a report he was ill.

ing an analysis of significant factors and an evaluation of existing disabilities of the patients in an attempt to determine the need for vocational rehabilitation in terms of university, vocational or on-the-job training offered veterans.

Tests and surveys measure the patient's interests, aptitudes and intellectual endowment so that the patient's thinking may be directed into specific occupational fields. But the counselor must keep in mind at all times the limitations imposed by the illness of the patient, Allen said.

With the aid of the extensive occupational information library, patients are then in a position to form some conclusions as to the selection of an objective. From there, Allen said it is a matter of an appropriate training institution and arranging details of vocational plans.

"These plans usually work out," Allen said, "and we have discovered that by completing arrangements while the patient is still in the hospital's protective atmosphere, emotionally upsetting periods of inactivity are avoided. Thus, a recurrence of the symptoms of illness are also avoided, to a great extent."

Allen concluded the program by asking Dr. Haskins' views on the program.

"For years many of us have felt that better vocational guidance for everyone might be possible," Dr. Haskins said.

"Without guidance in the school or home, the average individual drifts into an occupation by happenstance, without adequate information about himself or the job. If some guidance plan could be worked out in high school for each individual, I think there would be fewer misfits in life and fewer unhappy people," Dr. Haskins concluded.
