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Spring Sports Outlook Good On Duck Campus

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, March 15.—The prospects for an action-packed spring sports schedule were good today as four University of Oregon teams continued heavy workouts and a fifth began making final preparations for a later turnout.

Only Coach Jim Aiken's football squad was among the missing on the practice fields. The Duck footballers were due to report for spring practice on April 3 and the Webfoot boss announced the practice sessions would end with the annual spring game and clinic on May 19 and 20.

Aiken faces a tough rebuilding job, particularly in the backfield. The top four Oregon backs of 1949, Bob Sanders, Woodley Lewis, George Bell and Johnny McKay, will not be returning for the 1950 season. The Ducks also lost top linemen in Steve Dotter, Sam Nevills, Darrell Robinson, Ed Chrobot, Lou Robinson and Les Hagen.

Sophomores are expected to break into the lineup in both the backfield and at the ends. Aiken has Gus Knickrehm and Jerry Moschinsky returning at tackle, Chester Daniels and Ray Lung at guard and Dave Gibson at center to form an all-lettermen center of the line.

In track, Coach Bill Bowerman is expected to have one of the better teams in recent years. Led by George Rasmussen, one of the finest pole vaulters in the world, the Ducks have experienced personnel in almost every event. Three sophomores, Jack Hutchins in the mile and Chuck Missfeldt in the javelin, and Bill Fell in the sprints are tabbed as certain new strength.

Baseball Coach Don Kirsch is faced with a complete rebuilding program. Four lettermen from last year's second place team have been graduated and five additional starters turned to professional baseball ahead of their graduation. Mel Krause, Jim Hanns and DeWayne Johnson are expected to be the top pitchers and Ray Stratton in the outfield and Don Kimball at third base are the only other regulars returning.

National AAU Tourney At Denver Opens Sunday

DENVER, March 15.—(AP)—Forty-two teams were entered today for the national A.A.U. basketball tournament which opens a weeklong stand Sunday.

Heading the bulky field will be the Oakland, Calif., Blue 'N' Golds, defending champions, and the potent Phillips Oilers of Bartlesville, Okla.

The field will be cut to 16 for the quarter finals Wednesday night. The official entries to date include: Bradford Clothiers, Portland, Ore.; Seattle, Wash., university; Inland Empire Sixty-Sixers, Spokane, Wash. and Alpine Dairy, Seattle.

The Philadelphia Athletics have finished in the first division of the American League only once since 1933.

VERO BEACH, Fla., March 15.—(AP)—Pitchers Don Newcombe and Carl Erskine and second baseman Jackie Robinson are the newest members on the Brooklyn Dodgers' ailing list.

The two pitchers have sore arms and Robinson yesterday pulled up with a lame leg during the Brooklyn-Mobile exhibition game. Robbie aggravated an old pulled ligament in his left thigh and this could temporarily hold up his conditioning, since running is what he needs.

PHOENIX, Ariz., March 15.—(AP)—Three New York Giants, including Manager Leo Durocher, are battling the flu germ.

Slugging outfielder Bobby Thompson and infielder Roy Zimmerman are the other victims. Durocher disregarded the advice of club physician Dr. Anthony Palermo and visited the field yesterday, but soon realized the doc was right and returned to his hotel quarters.

BRADENTON, Fla., March 15.—(AP)—Boston Braves Manager Billy Southworth intends to stand a veteran club today against Cincinnati's Reds in an exhibition game at Tampa. Johnny Sain, who had a poor season last summer, will pitch the first three innings against the Reds.

PASADENA, Calif., March 15.—(AP)—General Manager Frank Lane of the Chicago White Sox will visit Palm Springs Friday, possibly with the idea of looking into the desert spot as a future training site.

The White Sox are committed to another spring session in Pasadena but it is unlikely they will return in 1952. Lane leans to Florida as a training camp but may consider Palm Springs where a new baseball park has been built.

The Sox after being smashed 12-7 by the Pittsburgh Pirates yesterday, were at their home base today to face the St. Louis Browns with Bill Wight and Luis Aloma slated for pitching duty.

LAKE LAND, Fla., March 15.—(AP)—The Detroit Tigers uncovered a class A-1 pitching prospect Tuesday in beating the New York Yankees, 3-1, in an exhibition contest.

The Bengals started 20-year-old Ray Herbert, a Detroit high school graduate, against the Yanks. And in the three innings he pitched, Herbert yielded only one hit.

The slim right-hander earlier had pitched three scoreless innings in an intra-squad battle. He was with Toledo last season, winning 16 and losing 17.

Right now, he rates as one of the best prospects in the Tiger camp, but may be sent back to the minors for more seasoning.

TUCSON, Ariz., March 15.—(AP)—Bob Feller, who hopes to become a 20-game winner again this year, was set to make his first exhibition start for the Cleveland Indians today.

Manager Lou Boudreau listed him for a four-inning stint against the Oakland Oaks of the Pacific Coast league. The tribesmen returned to their home base after the New York Giants handed them a 5-3 beating yesterday in Phoenix.

TAMPA, Fla., March 15.—(AP)—Maybe it's just an early spring surge of power but those Cincinnati Reds suddenly have become sluggers.

They only have a 2-2 record in their first four exhibition games, but in the last three tilts they have belabored Detroit Tiger and Philadelphia Phil pitchers for 25 runs on 36 hits. The hit production has included eight home runs, four triples and seven two-baggers.

The Reds came through with a 7 to 5 triumph over the Phils yesterday.

HOLES SAVE QUAIL

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 15.—(AP)—Conservationists are building water holes for quail, says the U.S. Wildlife Service. With these aids the birds can live in dry areas where they could not stay without them.

The water holes are of concrete with an underground storage capacity of about 700 gallons. Enclosures are made small to check evaporation and keep out coyotes and other predators. A concrete apron collects water from what rains there and it is stored automatically for future use of the quail.

Dentist Sued As Operation Sequel

SEATTLE, March 15.—(AP)—A trial in which a Bellingham woman seeks \$79,734 for being reduced to a "cadaverous and bizarre" appearance as the result of a dental operation opened in superior court Monday.

The woman is 51-year-old Miss Elsie Holland. She is suing Dr. O. T. Dean, Seattle dentist, who performed the operation on June 17, 1947.

Instead of removing only a small piece of cartilage and severing a nerve, she alleges, Dr. Dean removed more cartilage than was necessary and failed to sever the nerve.

Since then, she said, she:

1. Has been unable to wear dentures.
2. Has been in constant pain.
3. Has been unable to eat solid foods and suffers from malnutrition as a result.
4. Has suffered damage to her digestive system.
5. Must take pain-killing narcotics.
6. Has suffered partial paralysis of the throat.
7. Has become "cadaverous and bizarre" in appearance with much consequent humiliation and mental suffering.

Lack Of Right Food Is Blamed For Fatal Germs

LOS ANGELES, March 15.—(AP)—It's not the germs that kill you, says Dr. Jonathan Forman, it's the food you don't eat.

"People do not die of infectious diseases but really from malnutrition that allows the germ to gain its foothold," Dr. Forman, of Ohio

State medical school, Monday told 1000 doctors at a convention of the College of Medical Evangelists.

"In non-infectious fatal disease, too," he said, "bad nutrition is the cause in every instance. Creative medicine must be founded on growing the best possible foods."

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
