

### Sidelights On Observance Of St. Patrick's Day

ST. PATRICK, Mo., March 17.—(AP)—Sure and they were wearing the green today in St. Patrick—all 53 of them.

This little village claims to be the only St. Patrick in the world. Atlases bear this out.

These have been busy times for the postmistress—Mrs. Laveta Logsdon, and the village priest—the Rev. Francis O'Duignan, no less. He's only 10 years out of Ireland himself.

Mrs. Logsdon estimates she has canceled between 40,000 and 45,000 letters from all over the world from persons who want the St. Patrick postmark.

Father O'Guilinan adds a special touch to many of the letters—a shamrock with the legend, "St. Patrick, the only one in the world."

The inhabitants and natives of the surrounding rolling hills will gather at the school tonight for dancing and games. There will be real shamrocks—brought here from Ireland—for all.

The red-haired priest hopes to fulfill a dream—to a shrine to St. Patrick in this town. About \$10,000 has been accumulated.

The village was founded about 1937 by Irish immigrants. Many of their descendants live here.

### SETTLED AT \$14 COST

JERSEY CITY, N. J., March 17.—(AP)—The Irishmen were arguing in a tavern yesterday about exactly what the angle of slant was of the rooftops from which riflemen fired in Ireland's Easter Monday rebellion of 1916.

The pre-St. Patrick's day argument grew hot. When a fight seemed imminent, the bartender put in a trans-Atlantic telephone call to William Sweetman, editor of the Irish press in Dublin.

It is not recorded just what Sweetman said the slant of the rooftops was in 1916, but it settled the dispute.

The phone call cost the bartender \$15.

### Dorothy Kenyon Blasts M'Carthy

GLEN ROCK, N.J., March 17.—(AP)—Dorothy Kenyon last night called Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.) "the worm from Wisconsin" and said he needed the limelight because he is beginning to slip in his own state.

Miss Kenyon, 62-year-old former state department employee, was accused last week by McCarthy of being affiliated with Communist-front organizations.

She was "Case No. 1" in a long list of alleged Communist sympathizers in the state department submitted by McCarthy to the senate foreign relations committee. She denied all the charges.

Miss Kenyon, in a speech before the men's club of the Glen Rock Community church, also referred to the Congressman as the "young loachinvar from the west."

"It is appalling that under the cloak of congressional immunity a congressman may destroy the work of a lifetime in assassinating a person's character when that person has no regress," she said.

"This sort of thing was practiced by Hitler."

Miss Kenyon is a former New York city judge.

### Uranium Source Ore To Undergo Studies

NEDERLAND, Colo., March 17.—(AP)—Company officials said Wednesday work will start immediately to determine the extent of a vein of pitchblende—prime source of strategic uranium—they say has been uncovered in the depths of an old silver mine.

The statement was made as new officers of the consolidated Caribou Mines, Inc., began an inspection of the mine. The new president, Donald M. Nelson, former chairman of the war production board, told workmen in a speech: "The success of this country may depend on what we find here."

Nelson said that if the mine lives up to expectations, it may make the United States independent of foreign sources of uranium for use in atomic bomb and research work and set off a new mining boom for the vital mineral along the front range of the Rockies.

### NAVY QUOTAS UPPED

Chief A. L. DeMott, local U. S. Navy recruiter, announced today that a greatly enlarged increase in Navy quotas is expected for the coming three months.

The Roseburg office was notified today of the increased quotas. Young men between the ages of 17 and 31 who are interested in further information on Navy enlistment are urged to call or visit the recruiting office, located in the armory building.

#### Safeway Granted Review Of Milk Sale Limitation

PORTLAND, March 17.—(AP)—Safeway stores' attempt to expand its milk distribution to the Salem area was in circuit court today.

Judge James W. Crawford agreed to review a decision by the state milk marketing administrator that limited Safeway to the Portland market.

The judge directed milk administrator Thomas J. Ohlsen to hand over records of a January hearing in which the store chain was denied permission to sell its own brand of milk (Lucerne) in its Salem stores.

The chain proposed to buy milk from Salem dairymen, process it in a Safeway plant now operated in Portland, and sell the milk in paper cartons in its Salem stores. The chain wants Ohlsen's decision reversed.

The judge gave Ohlsen until April 4 to produce the records for review.

#### KING GEORGE OBLIGES

LONDON, March 17.—(AP)—King George VI gave the Irish guards—the "Micks"—Irish shamrocks today in celebration of St. Patrick's Day and the regiment's fiftieth birthday.

The king, colonel-in-chief, handed over the greenery at a regimental parade at Chelsea barracks. Elizabeth and Field Marshal Viscount Alexander, governor-general of Canada and commander of the regiment, were there.

So was Mrs. Josephine O'Keefe of Rosscabery, County Cork, Ireland. The shamrocks had been flown over from her garden.

It was in 1900 that Queen Victoria commanded that the Irish guards be founded in honor of the bravery of Irish regiments in the Boer war.

Judge Riddle, also reported that George Harrison Bowman, 34, Roseburg, was committed to the city jail in lieu of a \$20 fine upon his plea of guilty to a drunk charge.

**TRIP HOLDS PATHOS**  
ASTORIA, March 17.—(AP)—Thomas Hopkins will long remember this St. Patrick's day.

It's the one he celebrates, not knowing his son has just been killed.

That's because the father, now 60, is making a trip to Ireland that he long has been saving for. He was scheduled to have reached England yesterday, but no one could bring the death of Thomas Hopkins Jr., 32. Relatives said that young Hopkins, killed in a woods accident in God's Valley near here, would have wanted it that way.

"He would not want to spoil his dad's first trip to Ireland," they said.

A rolling log crushed young Hopkins yesterday. Besides the father, he is survived by the mother and three brothers: Leo and John of Birkenfeld, Ore., and Patrick of San Francisco.

### Filbert Orchard Dug Up Because Profit Vanishes

Because labor costs, compared with returns from the crop, make it impossible to realize a profit, one of Douglas county's oldest filbert orchards was dug up this week to make way for a more profitable crop.

John Burkhardt, whose farm is located south of the Riverside Grange hall in rich river bottom land, said that he was bulldozing the entire orchard of 14 acres.

The filbert trees have stood for nearly 20 years and have been bearing heavily, according to Burkhardt. He said he has actually taken a loss on his crop the last couple of years because of the high labor cost in maintaining the orchard and paying pickers.

He plans to seed the land to clover or a similar crop.

### Deserter From Marines Arrested By City Police
