Pour Cheese Over Ham, Asparagus

For that special party when you want to please and impress your friends, try either of these two California recipes. They have flavor, consistency and difference.

Ham and Asparagus on Toast with Cheese Sauce (Serves 4)

Three-quarters cup milk, 1 cup soft bread crumbs, 1 cup (1/4 pound) shredded processed American or Cheddar cheese, 4 tablespoons sherry wine or 1/4 cup milk, 1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, salt and paprika to taste, 4 slices buttered toast, 4 slices boiled or baked ham, 1 (No. 2 1/2) can asparagus tips or about 24 cooked asparagus tips.

Scald milk in the top of a double boiler over direct heat; remove from heat and add bread crumbs; let stand 10 or 15 minutes. Add cheese and cook over boiling water, stirring frequently, until cheese is melted; add sherry or milk, Worcestershire sauce, salt and paprika. Lay slices of toast on a baking sheet; cover each with a slice of ham; arrange asparagus tips on top of the ham.

Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 10 to 15 minutes, or until thoroughly heated. Remove from oven and lift onto plates with a spatula; cover with the hot cheese sauce; serve at once.

Boy Bicyclist Killed As He Coasts Into Auto

MEDFORD, March 17. —(AP)—A bicycling boy was fatally injured Wednesday night when his bike and a car collided as he was coasting down a hill.

The boy, Raymond Douglas Lewis, 11, died enroute to a hospital.

Roland Emerson of Griffin creek reported the boy coasted out of a blind roadway against the car's fender.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter G. Lewis, South Stage road.

Schoolmaster Faces Charges

EUFULA, Okla., March 17. —(AP)—Schoolmaster W. E. Dickey pleaded innocent Friday before Justice of the Peace James Asher to a felony charge of lewdly pawing girl pupils in his two-room country school.

He waived preliminary hearing and was freed under \$2,000 bond to await a jury trial.

County Attorney James Whiteley said the information in the felony complaint against Dickey was the same as that in a misdemeanor charge brought earlier, except that the newest charge alleges the acts were committed in private.

Whiteley said the misdemeanor charge came from complaints of pupil's parents that he snapped the elastic on their panties.

Earlier Friday a dozen men, all patrons of the Cathey school where Dickey and his wife taught, called on Whiteley with a petition reaffirming the patrons' confidence in the 33-year-old Dickey.

The accusations were aired earlier before the Eufaula school board which cleared Dickey and allowed him to continue teaching.

Dickey and his wife are the only teachers at the two-room Cathey schoolhouse four miles north of Eufaula. Both have taught for more than 20 years.

Spruce Budworm Battle To Begin In Two Months

SALEM, March 17. —(AP)—The battle against the spruce budworm—biggest insect control operation ever attempted in Oregon—will begin in 60 days when 500,000 gallons of DDT solution will be sprayed by airplane on 500,000 acres of infested forest lands, the State Forestry department announced.

This project is the state's half of the job. At the same time, the U. S. forest service will spray an equal amount of federal forest land.

The first activity will be in the Kinzua area of Wheeler county, where more than 160,000 acres of bug-infested land will be given the DDT bath. This will start late in May.

The Forestry department will open bids next month for rental of airplanes to do the job.

The budworm can be killed only during two weeks of each year. That is during the time the bug emerges.

It only takes a gallon of the spray per acre. It kills 97 percent of the bugs outright, and the rest are fatally injured.

The airplanes have to fly from 75 to 150 feet above the tree tops.

TV Hurting Movie Box Receipts, Skouras Says

PORTLAND, March 17. —(AP)—Television is cutting into movie box office receipts, Charles P. Skouras, 61, president of the National Theatre Amusement company, said here.

Skouras predicted that movie houses would have to develop more showmanship to compete with television.

He cited another factor in the slump of box office revenue: family budgets. Many families can't afford to go to movies too often.

JOKE ON HARDIMAN

A clear-eyed, serious young chap with remarkable mechanical aptitude, he has been soloing on his father's tractor in the family orange grove for several months. Freddy began by tinkering with cars and removing the locks from doors—not always to the benefit of these devices.

The boy's father decided to divert this test for mechanics into useful channels and taught him to plow a furrow through the orange trees.

German Student Of Myrtle Point Speaks At Rotary

For international understanding we must know other people, and the school is a basic platform from which to start, John Haese, Bremen, Germany, told members of the Roseburg Rotary International club at the regular Thursday meeting at the Hotel Umpqua.

Haese, who is attending Myrtle Point high school through the sponsorship of the Church of the Brethren, pointed out the differences between schooling in Germany and the United States. Speaking fluent English, the student told of the ease in which he changed from "Oxford" English to American slang, because of the language basis he had learned in high school in Germany. "I couldn't understand anyone when I came last September," he said, "but it was very easy to learn." He pointed out that he is one of 80 German youths studying in this country, but that he is not an exchange student.

Although there are many variations, the German student has usually studied four languages by the time he leaves high school, Haese said. These are, besides German, English, Latin and French. The order in which they are studied also varies. "The girls study French before Latin," he said, "because French is the language of ladies." The boys usually study English, then Latin, then French in high school, he explained.

But the high school setup is very different from that in this country, he emphasized.

A person may go to grade school eight years then enter his life's work. Or, if he can pass the rigid ability tests, he may enter high school after the fourth year and continue for eight years there. There are no optional courses or specialization until you go to college, he said. There is a week's test at the end of high school to determine graduation and the right to go to college. If one course is flunked, and you are held over a year, you're out. The same applies if you once quit school. Another thing which would "boost" you out of high school is getting married; the student maintained, something which doesn't apply at Myrtle Point.

In the larger German cities, such as Bremen, the girls and boys go to different schools, Haese said, but he had attended a coeducational school before moving to Bremen. He believes the coeducational system is the best.

The student, who drew a warm reception from Rotary members, was introduced by Harold Hoyt, program chairman for the day. After the meeting, he went on a tour of Roseburg senior high school.

Sheriff's Posse To Offer Drill At Portland Rodeo

Suit Filed Here On Money Claim

Fannie Mae Patton filed suit in circuit court Thursday against Ray C. and Alta Pierce, husband and wife, for \$6,875 plus interest and costs, the alleged balance due on property sold by plaintiff to the defendant, according to an agreement.

The complaint adds that in event the defendant does not make satisfaction, the plaintiff shall be entitled to immediate possession of the property, described as being located on the northerly side of the Oregon state highway 235 and northeast of Sutherland Land and Water company.

National Guard Must Pay Tax On Drill Earnings

SALEM, March 17. —(AP)—National guardsmen have to pay income taxes to the state for the money they get for attending weekly drills, Attorney General Neuner ruled.

But he said they don't have to pay state income taxes on the money they get for attending the annual two weeks' camp.

The state income tax law gives a \$3,000 exemption to men on active service in the armed forces. Neuner ruled that the weekly drills are not active service, but that the annual training camp is active service.

A private gets \$2.75 for each of his weekly drills, and the same amount for each day spent in the training camp. The amount increases by rank. For instance, a first lieutenant draws \$8.31 a day.
