Sally Baker, the Pikesville, Kentucky public health nurse who has just returned from a tour of Europe as the "Queen of America" reported to representatives of 20-million organized women the other day, that "European women are working for peace at any price." She made her report at Mutual headquarters in New York City shortly after she arrived at the airport from Paris. Mrs. Baker, elected last January 6 on the "Queen" show as the outstanding clubwoman of America, said that in her international good-will tour of Europe she found the United States "lauded by the women of the western countries for her invaluable aid via the Marshall Plan." She added: "But these countries are getting the jitters as the time approaches when ECA will stop. If ECA stops, especially to Italy and Greece, I have grave fears that those nations will become Communist." Mrs. Baker made her report to the Girl Scouts of America, the General Federation of Women's Clubs, the National Congress of Parents and Teachers and many other service organizations. These groups, representing 20-million club women in this country, asked Mrs. Baker to survey the European clubwomen for them and report on her return.
