

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Agriculture department says it will pay Oregon and Washington filbert growers up to 4.75 cents a pound for 2,800,000 pounds of unshelled nuts.

The subsidy is designed to enable processors to get the nuts at prices which, officials said, should enable them to dispose of the filberts in consumer markets in the shelled form.

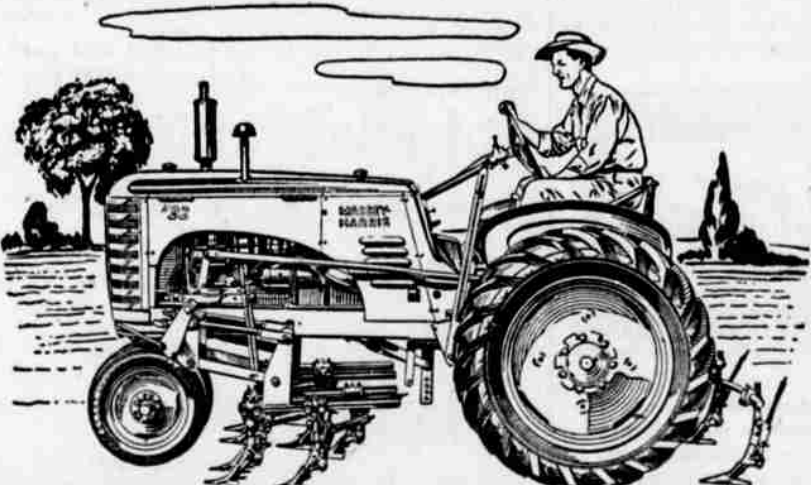

Disabled Veterans Need Opportunity To Train On Job

More than 50 disabled World War II veterans in Oregon, ready and willing to train for jobs they can fill despite their handicaps, have been waiting for more than a month just for a chance to train on the job, according to the Veterans administration.

The VA has been trying to find places of training for these veterans—in industry, business establishments, offices and the like—but with little success.

Past surveys have revealed that most disabled veterans training on-the-job were learning to be mechanics and repairmen, electric workers, metalworkers, construction workers and salesmen. Veterans now waiting for training opportunities are looking for openings along those same lines.

Given the chance, the average disabled veteran most likely will succeed in his job training, and become an asset to his employer, according to the VA.

Most job training establishments in the past have been small firms able to train only a few veterans. In some cases they have trained only one. The small establishments are as welcome to the job training program as are giant industries and businesses capable of training hundreds, the VA said.

Employers desiring to take on veteran trainees may contact their nearest VA field office for full details on how to go about it.

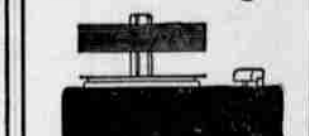

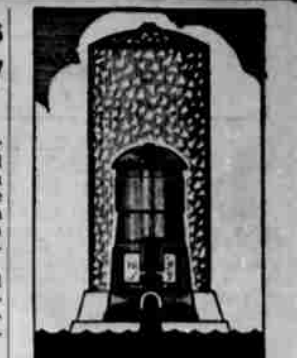
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
