

Dillard To Show Art Masterpieces

Reproductions of works of artists of many generations will be on display at the Dillard school April 3-7 inclusive.

This collection consists of 150 masterpieces representing the French, Italian, Flemish, English, Dutch, Spanish, German and American schools of art. Most of these are the masterpieces studied by the schools. Famous portraits, landscapes and pastoral scenes in the colors of the original canvases are on display. This exhibit is sponsored by the Dillard P. T. A. A small admission will be charged for the purpose of raising a fund with which to buy pictures for the school. The public is invited to see these works of art. The pictures will be on display during the day for the school children and from 4 p. m. to 9 p. m. for the public.

The exhibit will be hung in the play shed back of the old school building. Tickets will be sold by the school children and at the door of the exhibit.

job of waiting by speeding up the process of making more power available. It is not the government's purpose to discourage private power measures.

Double Capacity Is Goal

Under the program now before Congress, Raver said the present plant capacity in the Northwest will be doubled, with an addition of 2,000,000 kilowatts. An additional 1,500,000 KW will be added by 1958—a total which will give this region its first "synthetic surplus." Dr. Raver said new industry will not be offered the power it needs until the latter date, because "the pent-up demand of industry already located here will use up the power furnished this region until 1958."

However, he declared that all minimum demands will be taken care of by 1953.

Discussing the power program in terms of local areas, Raver said the government's problem is "how to supplement the power supplies of the various local districts."

Copco Tie In Planned

He said this is being done by program with that of the local units.

"At present, the Oregon loop of B.P.A. is integrated with all of these units except the California Oregon Power company, and steps are being taken to tie in with Copco, too," he said.

Advantages of such an integrated program, he said, include additional value of generating facilities and improvements to the area's economy.

Dr. Raver spoke briefly of the proposed 230,000-volt Oregon loop which will extend south from Maupin to Klamath Falls, then north to Roseburg and Cottage Grove, with a large substation at Goshen to serve the southwestern portion of the state.

A number of out-of-town persons were guests of the Chamber of Commerce, including Copco and Bonneville authorities and city officials. Their presence at the speaker's table caused Chamber of Commerce President Harold Schmeer to quip, "I don't know when I've sat down with so much power."

The guests included A. S. Cummins, Copco president; Mayor D. L. Flynn of Medford and Mayor Morris Milbank of Grants Pass; Henry Alderman, executive administrator for Bonneville; and William Trommerhausen, regional manager from Eugene. Dr. Raver was introduced by Mayor Al Flegel, who arranged the program.

Present plans, he reported, call for first priority in the Klamath Falls area where a serious shortage exists. Copco's Toketee project, he said, if not divided with the Klamath region, will carry much of the load increase anticipated immediately in the Roseburg area.

In the meantime, he pointed out, Bonneville is hopeful some method can be arranged whereby surplus power from the Columbia grid can be transmitted into Southern Oregon to assist in supplying industrial and domestic needs.

city will be \$1. The ordinance outlines what constitutes food handlers, diseases and other legal interpretations, makes it unlawful for an establishment to employ persons who have not had examinations, or persons with diseases or carriers thereof, and also makes it unlawful for a food handler to work without the examination. The ordinance also provides for fines or imprisonment in the city hall for violators.

Time Saving Deferred

While the council is generally in accord on day light saving time, the matter was once again held in abeyance to await the final decision of neighboring towns. Mayor Albert G. Flegel said the mayors of Medford and Grants Pass had partially adopted the early hour. Eugene and Corvallis have already voted daylight saving time.

Another matter held in abeyance was the proposed extension of Umpqua Ave. E. to connect with Bowden and Riverside drives, city manager, M. W. Slankard submitted a report advising the work when funds were available.

Sever Lines Resurveyed

Slankard reported that a resurvey has been made of West Roseburg sewers and he reaffirmed that all homes now built or to be erected on vacant lots can be served by the proposed lines. The plans, he said, were submitted to the city manager's report. He stated that the school board had been queried on an alternate proposal to bring the road through the high school property, but this met with disapproval by the school board.
