Skater Maribel Vinson Tells Views On America's Young Ice Enthusiasts

NEW YORK. — (AP) — The two young daughters of Maribel Vinson have made an even earlier start in life than did their famous mother.

"Both my girls took up ice skating at the age of 2," she laughed. "I was 3 myself when I began." That was 35 years ago. Her father strapped a pair of double runners on her feet, she took a few tentative steps—and was off on a career that was to make her one of the best known figures in American sports.

"My mother used to get me up at 4:30 in the morning," she recalled, "and I'd spend an hour riding into Boston on a cold street car so I could get to a rink early enough to practice by myself."

Skating was pure joy and passion to her. Maribel won her first women's national figure skating at 16, and she captured it eight more times before she turned professional in 1938. Only one woman consistently beat her in world competition—Sonja Henie.

Today, at 38, she still spends eight to ten hours a day on the St. Moritz club rink at Berkeley, Calif., teaching her skill to youthful enthusiasts.

"I'm rather at another crossroads in my life now," she said. "I never want to give up skating—after all my mother still skates at 70 and my father skated until he was 76—but I don't want to spend my whole time at it." Maribel feels that many skaters today spend entirely too much of their lives on the ice.

"Now children take up skating

with the definite idea of turning professional, a goal unheard of when I was growing up. And I think it can be definitely bad for them.

"Most of this high-pressure is unnecessary. A great skater does not have to skate all year round to keep great—but if your competitor does it, you do it. It's just a merry-go-round. Some youngsters even give up college because they don't believe they can carry an academic routine and do their training, too."

Miss Vinson thinks some performers would learn to figure skate better if they actually spent fewer hours on the ice—and took piano lessons.

"It would teach them a sense of rhythm," she said. "I asked her how she felt about her old rival, Miss Henie, the one girl she could never beat."

"It's funny you asked me about that," she smiled. "Sonja and I were always friendly—and still are. But with my two daughters I feel I am two laps ahead of her now."



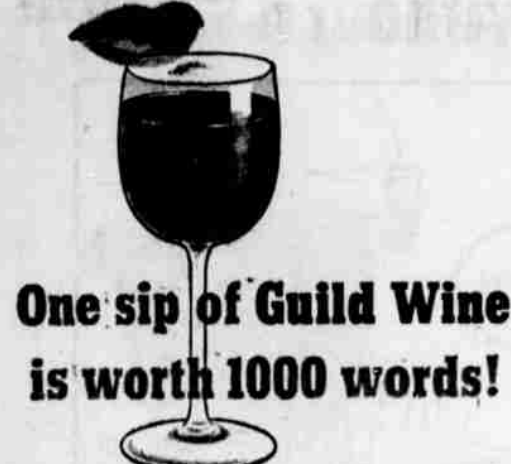
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
