More Pitching Power Principal Need Of Oakland

OAKLAND, Calif., March 24.—(P)—Oakland will finish in the first race if owner Brick Laws and manager Charley Dressen can strengthen the pitching staff.

And if veterans like Billy Herman and Augie Galan hold up through the 200-game schedule, the Oaks might be stronger contenders than last year when they finished second to Hollywood.

A lot will depend on how the New York Yankees fulfill their obligations. The world champions owe the Oaks a pitcher for Ralph Buxton, sold to the Yanks last August, is now with San Francisco.

The Yanks also owe Oakland six players on the sale of Jackie Jensen and Billy Martin, although they have two years to make delivery.

Oakland opens the season with left-handed pitching strength, with holdovers Charley Gassaway, Ert Jones, Forrest Thompson and Lou Tost, who won 50 games between them, back with the club. Added starters are Clyde Shoun, veteran relief man, and Don Ferrarese, a rookie.

Righthanders include Frank Nelson, a 14-game winner in '49; Allen Gettel, Jim Tote, Earl Harriett and Carl De Rose, the latter on trial from Beaumont.

So said Joe DiMaggio, star outfielder of the world champion New York Yankees yesterday in denying a report he is suffering from a serious shoulder injury.

Joel's Joe said his shoulder was hurt years ago, but that it does not interfere with his hitting or throwing.

Last spring and the first part of the season DiMaggio's heel kept him out of the lineup, but a spur on the heel has not bothered him this year.

Defending champion Dorothy Traugot of San Francisco finished third with 231.

Aid For Foreign Churches Urged

BUCK HILL FALLS, Pa., March 24.—(P)—United States members of the World Council of Churches will be asked to raise an emergency appropriation of \$581,000 for the aid of churches in Europe and Asia.

Dr. Robert C. Mackie, associate general secretary of the council from Geneva, Switzerland, told 80 delegates attending the final session of the USA council yesterday that the money is necessary to "forestall the collapse of cooperative aid to churches in Europe and Asia."

A report adopted by the delegates said that unless the funds were raised within the next nine months the inter-church aid program might have to be abandoned and a "large proportion of world Protestantism would receive a staggering blow."

"Economic conditions in Europe and some parts of Asia have improved notably in the last two years," the report said, "yet the extent of human suffering remains immense. It is necessary to extend humanitarianism and charitable activities far beyond the emergency originally estimated."

Jack Nichols Stars In Triumph Of Blackhawks

MOLINE, Ill., March 24.—(P)—Jack Nichols, former University of Washington all-coast basketball center, scored 23 points last night, including a free throw in the final three seconds, to pace the Tri-City Blackhawks to a 76-75 win over the Anderson Packers.

The victory evened the teams' best-of-three series for the National Basketball association's western division playoff.
