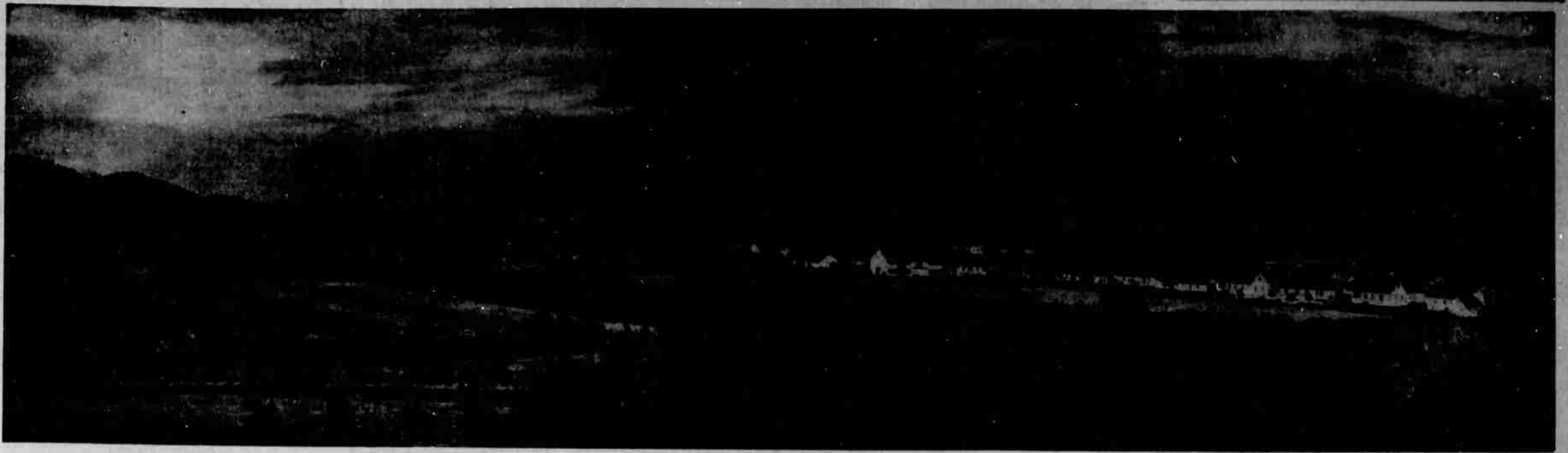




SITES OF NEW SCHOOL STRUCTURES—Pictured above is the 21-acre site of the proposed new Fullerton grade school. Voters of Roseburg school district 4 will cast their ballots April 17 as to whether permission shall be granted to build the new school and expand the present high school facilities with funds the school board now has on hand. Situated west of Coates addition (shown at right), the property extends from foot of Mt. Nabo (nearest camera) to a boundary line 850 feet from Harvard Ave. West boundary extends into the orchard, at left of picture. The site is about one mile west of Oak street bridge, near the center of Roseburg's west-side population. Bids on the proposed grade school would be called for on alternates of 16, 18 and 20 rooms. Photo at right shows present senior high and Fullerton schools and the area in front of high school (center), now used as parking space, on which the new library-arts building will be constructed. Bids on the \$158,678 building were announced Tuesday by the school board. Over-all expansion plans call for remodeling of the present high school building, construction of the new library-arts structure and expansion into the present Fullerton grade school—entirely financed by funds now on hand. The measure to come before voters April 17 will be in the form of a "permissive" election in which the school board is asking the privilege of using existing funds for the two projects outlined above. Brain Surgery Under Local Anesthetic Is Successful On Test Before Group Of Doctors

BALTIMORE, March 24.—(AP)—A 14-year-old schoolboy was undergoing brain surgery under a local anesthetic. The surgeon took a fine wire carrying a small charge of electricity and touched it to a certain area of the boy's exposed brain. "I see two men sitting in an armchair," the youngster exclaimed. The electrode was removed. The men in the armchair vanished. Then it was touched to another area. This time the boy visioned "a man fighting."

Dr. Wilder G. Penfield, world-famed brain surgeon, told Johns Hopkins doctors last night that the electrical charge had activated dreams the boy had stored away. Dr. Penfield told how scientists are now able to turn memories

loss of the power of expression by speech, aphasia). While one patient was naming objects, stimulation was applied. Of one object he said, "Oh, I know what that is. That is what you put in your shoes," only after the electrode was withdrawn could he say "foot."

Dr. Penfield described the process as "a startling discovery (that) should have profound significance in the field of psychology, provided we can interpret the facts properly."

He said the experiments on 500 different cases have indicated that there is some mechanism of the brain that "inhibits"—presses back—other memory patterns in the same area as the one being "used" at the time.

Infant Survives Exposure In Snow

RIVERHEAD, N. Y., March 24.—(AP)—A baby that spent its first 42 minutes of life naked in a snow storm was reported doing nicely at a hospital today.

So was the infant's mother, a 15-year-old Negro girl who gave birth to the child Tuesday in an empty room at Riverhead junior high school while her classmates were at recess.

Alone and unattended during the birth, the girl became frightened afterward, and carried the baby outside, abandoning it under some trees, police said.

School officials learned of the event about a half-hour later and called police. The young mother was found back in class.

After questioning, police said, she led them into the school yard where the infant, a six-pound, one-ounce girl, was crying heartily in the snow.
