

Indian Track Men Compete In Field Day

'Good' Scores Recorded; Triangular Meet Is Set At Finlay Field April 1

Roseburg's track men will be ready when the starting whistle announces the opening event at the Sutherland-Myrtle Creek-Roseburg triangular meet, to be held at Finlay field Saturday, April 1, starting at 2 p.m.

Track Coach Frank Purdy put the local lads through an intensive session Thursday and Friday of this week, and they have pretty well decided for themselves who may be expected to cop first place awards in the season's opener.

Some 40 boys were divided into two teams and the intra-squad meet was under way. The Orange won over the Blacks 85-24-1-3, but two top Black speedsters left town and Orange's large margin was attributed to this fact. The absentees included Irvin Stritke and Mel Palmer, distance men.

Some interesting results were noted by Purdy, who said at least four boys showed up as being extremely swift for their first competition of the season, and on a slow track, to boot.

Larry Palmer, running the 440, did it in 58.7; not a speed record, Purdy qualified, but "good" for a start.

Jim Kemp, running the 880, turned in a 2:14.5. "Very good," according to Purdy. Other candidates for oral back slaps were Jim Shrum, who did the 220 dash in 24.5 and Jerry Sconce, who vaulted 9'6" his first week on the pole.

Altogether, 15 events were run off during the intra-squad meet. Purdy said he would release names of those who will participate in the triangular meet next Thursday.

U. C. L. A. Loses To Bradley's Braves 73-59

Winner Meets Baylor In Tonight's Playoff; Brigham Young Beaten

KANSAS CITY, March 25.—(AP)—Bradley's fast-finishing Braves and the upsetting Baylor Bears meet for the Western N.C.A.A. basketball crown tonight and a shot at the national collegiate finals.

Bradley wiped out a seven-point handicap in the last six and one-half minutes last night and swept to rout U.C.L.A. 73-59 after Baylor had come from behind to edge Brigham Young university, 56-55, in a sloppily-played opener.

Both Bradley and Baylor will go to New York next Tuesday for a game with the Eastern playoff winter and runnerup, respectively.

U.C.L.A. and Brigham Young, skyline champions which had been a six-point favorite over Baylor, will meet in the consolation game beginning at 8 p. m. (CST) tonight. The Bradley-Baylor game begins at 9:45 p. m. (CST).

A record crowd for the Westerns, 10,700, which had dozed through the first game, had just about counted Bradley out of the honors here when Bill Mann and All-American Paul Unruh began popping them in. The Braves poured in 23 points in the telling six and one-half minute stretch while the badly-disorganized Uclans were getting only two.

U.C.L.A. had come from behind on a sharp shooting attack led by Ralph Joeckel and George Stanich to gain a 33-33 halftime tie. The Bruins kept pace as the score was tied four times in the first six minutes of the second period.

The Pacific Coast champs were three points in front with ten minutes to go and with Eddie Sheldrake and Stanich hitting built up a seven point lead before Bradley's Unruh and Mann answered the fire ball.

Unruh, limited to five points by the fine guarding of Alan Sawyer for two thirds of the game, played third-fiddle in the scoring department. Teammate Gene Melchiorre was the game's high point man with 19 and Charles Grover had 16.

Stanich and Sawyer each scored 14 for U.C.L.A.

Holdovers Bill Ramsey and Al Lyons (23 homers) are the only experienced outfielders. Player-coach Doc Cramer can play part time, and Edo Vanni, Jim Keating, Dick Sinovic and Hillies Layne are scrapping for jobs.

The Rainiers are definitely hunting for outfield help and this particular correspondent is hunting for a good reason to rate them higher than fourth.

CCNY Favored To Win Over North Carolina

NEW YORK, March 25.—(AP)—Underdog North Carolina State will throw its sensational one-two scoring punch at CCNY—battling for its second national title—in tonight's eastern NCAA basketball final.

The pride of Dixie is the next-to-last quintet standing in the way of City College of New York's bid for an unprecedented "double." A victory tonight would put the Beavers one game from becoming the first team to win both the National Invitation and NCAA titles the same year.

CCNY defeated Bradley last Saturday for the invitation championship.

Even though N.C. State hopes to succeed where the country's No. 1, 2 and 3 teams—Bradley, Ohio State and Kentucky—failed, the odds-makers don't lean south. The local club rates a five-point favorite.

Ohio State also rates five points over Holy Cross in the consolation game (8 p. m. EST).

The finale is a match of Carolina's racehorse forwards, Sammy Ranzino and Dick Dickey, against a bunch of sophomores who have blown over five ranking opponents in a sensational late-season surge.

Ranzino gave City an indication of what to expect tonight by scoring 32 points in his club's victory over Holy Cross Thursday. That's a new NCAA record. Dickey, who scores 25, also is the Wolf Pack playmaker.

The confident City College five is aiming at a rematch with Bradley's unconvinced Braves.

Bradley, yearning for another crack at CCNY, is rooting for City to strangle the Wolf Pack. The Braves expect little trouble from Baylor in the western NCAA finale at Kansas City tonight.

The winners of tonight's final games in New York and Kansas City will play in Madison Square Garden Tuesday for the NCAA championship.

UCLA, defeated by Bradley 73-59 last night, is favored over Brigham Young in the Kansas City contest for third.

Reporters yesterday pinned Louis down on practically everything but "I think I am coming back."

"I think a comeback to win the championship would be as great an honor as retiring undefeated. No body has ever done that," Louis said.
