WASHINGTON, March 25.—(AP)—The National Labor Relations board has ordered representation elections among employees of two firms at their Pendleton and Hermiston, Ore., stores.

The elections are to be held within 30 days.

union, AFL, or the Teamsters' union, also AFL, or by neither. Employees of Safeway at the firm's Hermiston store will vote only on whether they want to be represented by the Retail Clerks union. Employees of Sigman food stores at the two cities will have identical choices: the Pendleton employees to

choose between the two unions and the Hermiston employees to decide whether they want the retail clerks to represent them.

In recent hearings, the clerks union asked that both the Hermiston and the Pendleton employees be grouped into single units. This was opposed by the teamsters who contended there was a multi-employer unit composed of all retail food stores in the Pendleton area.

The NLRB did not find there was such a multi-employer unit, but neither did it agree with the clerk's union that the Hermiston and Pendleton employees should be grouped in one unit.

The teamsters made no showing of representation for the Hermiston employees of the two firms, hence that union was not listed for the voting there.

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'Flying Saucers' Studied In 1942, Scientist Says

ROME, March 25.—(AP)—An Italian scientist says that types of flying discs were designed and studied in Germany and Italy as early as 1942.

Adolf Hitler and Benito Mussolini, he added, were interested in the instruments, the idea of which was developed concurrently both in Italy and Germany.

Flying discs or saucers have been reported sighted recently in many parts of the world. There has been no scientific confirmation of the existence of such things, nor any universally accepted explanation of what their purpose might be.

The Italian scientist, Giuseppe Belluzzo, noted Italian authority on projectiles and cannons and builder in 1963 of the first steam turbine in Italy, made his declarations in Rome's Giornale "Italia."

"There is nothing supernatural or Martian about flying discs," he said, "but they are simply rational application of recent technique."

Prof. Belluzzo expressed the opinion that "some great power is launching discs to study them."

Reports of flying discs in Italian skies have been frequent. The latest report came from northern Turin, where several persons said they saw a saucer speeding across the moonlit sky leaving a fiery trail.

Prof. Belluzzo's article was accompanied by a sketch showing the possible construction for a disc, using Nafta and air for propelling force. Belluzzo did not further identify "nafta," but it might mean Naphtha.

SALEM, March 25.—(AP)—Dr. E. R. Younce, Battleground, Wash., was appointed state veterinarian Friday to succeed Charles F. Haynes, resigned.

State agriculture E. L. Peterson, who made the appointment, said Dr. Younce will take over the job by July 1. Dr. Younce has worked for the federal bureau of animal

industry, and now is in private practice.

NON-SUPPORT CHARGED
