Much talk was under way concerning the railroad and plank road from Roseburg to Coos Bay. Most active in all this discussion in Roseburg were T. R. Sheridan, D. S. K. Buick, J. C. Fullerton, W. S. Hamilton and B. C. Agee.

The Portland Oregonian estimated that the population of the state had increased to 300,000 and the Empire Livery stable with A. C. Marks as proprietor advertised the best rigs in the city. Gentle horses especially for ladies.

Weddings listed during March included W. H. Jamieson and Gertrude Happersett, an event of March 26 with Rev. C. M. Hill officiating. Pickle castors, jelly dishes and pictures were much the vogue for wedding gifts.

J. H. McKay and Jennie Harten, the latter of Portland, were wed in that city March 15. Walter Williams and Sarah McCollum and Fred Weatherly and Easter McCollum featured a double wedding at Kellogg, March 23. At Elkton, Wm. J. Newman took Helen Brown for his bride, March 16.

Everyone was talking about the race between George Francis Train and Miss Regina Rothchild on a trip around the world. The former headed westward and Miss Rothchild, eastward, with Train bragging he was sure to complete his trip in 60 days.

In the central states the Mississippi river was on the rampage. In Chicago at the Grand Pacific hotel, the famed General Crook, great Indian fighter, died suddenly.

Also interesting to recall is the talk of two good-sized rowboats which were brought by box car over the Siskiyou from San Francisco. They were the purchase of the railroad company to navigate the new lake formed by a mountain slide in the Cow Creek canyon.
