Britain Starts Probe Of Antihistamine Drugs

LONDON, March 27. — (AP) — Britain's Medical Research council announced Saturday it had begun a series of tests to determine the value of anti-histamine drugs in treating the common cold. The announcement said the tests, which are to last several months, had been undertaken because of conflicting reports on the effect of the drugs. The council is an official government body charged with medical research. Britons deluged pharmacists with orders for the anti-histamine drugs after readings reports they were being advertised in the United States as one-day cold cures. After reports of a variety of ill-effects, including insomnia, loss of appetite and gastric poisoning, British drug manufacturers and a medical journal urged that the government put the drugs on the poison list.
