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School Plans Explained By City Supt. Elliott

voters give their okay, he said. A permissive vote on the question is to be held April 17 at the junior high school, between 2-4 p. m.

Site Already Bought

Although the property on which the proposed Fullerton school would be located has already been purchased, Elliott said it was paid for with funds voted several years ago. He said this purchase price is not to be deducted from the 1949 bond fund total.

Most of Elliott's remarks were in explanation of the 11-page pamphlet, "Roseburg's Public Schools — Past, Present, Future," compiled March 4 by Elliott and the city school board.

Graphs and charts gave a statistical review of the present situation, wherein city schools are termed "inadequate" to meet the community's needs. Graphic portrayals of the district's increasing birth rate substantiated Elliott's statements that the birth rate had increased from 280 in 1945 to 850 in 1949. This increase, plus additions to the city's school rolls from non-high school districts, will swell enrollments well above the capacity of existing school structures, Elliott said.

Safety Major Factor

During the question-answer period which followed his talk, Elliott told one member of the audience that the proposed new Fullerton school will be situated in the center of Roseburg's expanding west-side population. Located in the area immediately west of Coates addition, he said the 21 acres on which the school would be built is located 750 feet from Melrose road, both for purposes of safety and to keep away from traffic noise.

He further illustrated that the school would be in area's population center with the remark that 232 of Fullerton's 316 pupils are now transported by bus or some other type of conveyance. He estimated the number of youngsters who would walk to school at the new location would remain the same, because of the large number of school age and pre-school age children who live at Coates addition.

When asked the financial advisability of transporting most of the proposed grade school's pupils, Elliott said he was told by bus company officials the cost would be "just about the same" as it now is.

He stressed the safety measures in providing school bus transportation by declaring, "We have had no fatalities nor injuries to our youngsters since the school board authorized bus transportation several years ago."

He said this was first done as a result of a school-bound child being struck and killed by an automobile. Elliott declared the safety of the school children is of "primary importance."

Elliott was introduced to the audience by Leroy Hiatt, chairman of the chamber of commerce education committee, who indicated in his remarks that Elliott would appear during the next few weeks as guest speaker before several of the city service clubs.

VAN NUYS, Calif., March 28 —(AP)—A paraplegic veteran was under arrest today on suspicion of driving his specially equipped automobile as the getaway car in a \$2,000 robbery.

Stanley D. Hill, 25, a veterans hospital patient paralyzed from the waist down, and John Kerns, 25, were booked on suspicion of robbery yesterday. Helen Couchey, 28, bookkeeper for a gas station, said a man took money she was preparing to deposit in a bank and escaped in a car driven by another man.

Det. Henry Acosta said he spotted the getaway car near the veterans hospital and found the money underneath a seat. The two men were arrested on the hospital grounds.

Circus Elephant To Die For Killing Little Boy

SARASOTA, Fla., March 28 —(AP)—Dolly, a circus elephant, must pay with her life for crushing a five-year-old child to death.

The 27-year-old work beast stomped the child's head beneath her massive foot at the Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey quarters here Sunday.

The child, Roger Schooley, was feeding peanuts to several elephants when Dolly seized him with her trunk and dashed him to the ground. The animal had a reputation for gentleness.

Henry Ringling North, the circus' vice president, said last night that Dolly would be led to a huge pit dug for the purpose, given an overdose of some narcotic, and will be buried where she falls and dies.

Medford Man Killed In Kansas Traffic Crash

She filed her suit yesterday, naming Albine Gerlich, 29, Hallettsville, Tex., as a daughter and the only other heir. She said she lived with Grauman in Texas, which recognizes such marriages, between 1916 and 1920.

In Hallettsville, Miss Gerlich said "I am not her daughter. She's just trying to take someone in by using my name."

New Jersey Senate Votes Divorce Legality Limit

TRENTON, N. J., March 28 —(AP)—The State Senate passed a bill yesterday limiting recognition of divorces granted outside of New Jersey.

The act refuses to recognize any future out-of-state divorce if you live in New Jersey within 12 months before the decree, move back within 18 months after, or maintain a New Jersey residence.

The bill now goes to the Assembly.

Telephone Ban Faced By Florida Bookmakers

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., March 28 —(AP)—Florida state rules against use of telephones by bookmakers are going to be tighter beginning Saturday.

The railroad and public utilities commission yesterday announced a new rule requiring companies to cancel telephone and telegraph service upon notification by any law enforcement officer that it has been or is being used for gambling. The new regulation also forbids companies to install service if they have "reasonable grounds to believe" it will be used in violation of the law.

The new rule is effective April 1.
