Medical School Grads Okay For Navy Training

The Navy is accepting applications from medical school graduates and senior students for its annual civilian intern training program which begins July 1, 1950.

A total of 265 medical school graduates will receive 12 months of intern training in civilian hospitals and medical centers under the Navy program during the 1951 fiscal year. The deadline for applications is May 15.

Candidates selected are appointed lieutenants (Junior Grade) in the Medical corps of the Naval Reserve, and are required to serve on active duty in the Navy for a period of 24 months after completing their intern training. They receive the pay and allowances of their rank while in intern training and while on active duty.

To qualify, candidates must be graduates of an approved medical school, or enrolled in a fourth-year class; must meet eligibility standards for initial appointment in the Medical corps, Naval Reserve; and must have contracted for a rotating internship of 12 months' duration in an approved civilian hospital or medical center. The latter year of a 24-month rotating internship will be acceptable in cases of candidates already engaged in intern training.

Applications from Washington, Oregon, Montana, and Idaho must be filed by candidates through the office of Naval Officer Procurement, Federal Office Building, Seattle, Washington. The applications are then forwarded to the Bureau of Naval Personnel for recording, and to the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery for determination of the candidates physical and professional qualifications by a regularly convened intern selection board.

All candidates will be notified of their selection or non-selection for the program.

Electricity Costs Less Than Candles

SEATTLE, (AP)—The 7,023 candles it took to light up George Washington's inaugural ball cost \$147 at that time.

Today, the equivalent in electric light would cost only \$3.51.

That is the illuminating observation of Charles H. Goddard of Newburyport, Mass. He's the national president of the Illuminating Engineering society.

Goddard, manager of utility sales for Sylvania electric products of New York, City, was a featured speaker at the I. E. S. northwest regional conference, attended by delegates from Washington, Oregon, Montana, Idaho and British Columbia.

"Forty years ago a 100-watt incandescent light globe cost \$1.25, or about half a day's pay for an average laborer," he said. "Today it sells for 17 cents. And it gives twice as much light."

"Nevertheless, at least 85 percent of the lighting in the average American city is inadequate," he declared.

"The average home needs four times more light than it now has. The average classroom needs seven times more illumination."

Eisenhower To Appear Before Senate Committee

WASHINGTON, March 28 (AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower will tell a senate committee more this week about his statement that the United States has disarmed too drastically.

An army spokesman, to whom the general referred all military questions about his speech, said Eisenhower will appear before the Senate armed services committee about the middle of the week. Eisenhower, now president of Columbia university, gave his view on disarmament in a New York speech Thursday, without detail.

Defense Secretary Johnson has repeatedly praised Eisenhower for the job he did last year in reconciling and trimming money requests by the armed services to bring them within the \$13,000,000,000 defense budget for the year starting July 1.

SALEM, March 28 (AP)—Gov. McKay Saturday named two Oregon educators to a legislative advisory committee on problems of higher education in the West. Those named are Dr. Paul C. Packer, chancellor of higher edu-

cation and Dr. David Baird of the medical school. Attorney Gen. George Neuner was designated legal counsel.

The men will be members of a committee headed by California's Governor Earl Warren. Its formation was directed by the recent Western Governors' conference, and its report is to be made to the next meeting in November.
