

Chrysler Strike Parley Afoot Of Another Barrier

DETROIT, March 28.—(P)—Negotiations in the Chrysler strike were snagged today over particulars of the company's \$30,000,000 pension offer.

The CIO United Auto workers accused the company of "hedging," a charge which Chrysler immediately denied.

A result of the split was to set back hopes for an early settlement of the 63-day-old walkout which has idled 140,000 workers in the automobile industry.

However, the negotiations scheduled were unbroken with another session set for today.

Walter Reuther, union president, said at conclusion of yesterday's session that Chrysler had "deceived" its workers and the public by representing its \$30,000,000 offer as a funded plan.

In question are \$100 monthly pensions, including social security. Reuther accused the company of trying to resort to a "fancy book-keeping operation."

The UAW has been insistent in its demand that a pension fund be placed in trust similar to other pension agreements in the auto industry.

Denying Reuther's charges, a Chrysler spokesman said the company plan was "in a sense better than a trust fund."

The \$30,000,000, he said, would be placed in a "pension fund" and as each eligible employee retired

Injunction Against Alleged Trespass Asked

A perpetual decree, enjoining The Robert Dollar Co., and William and Bernice J. Jantzer and C. E. and Doris Johns, doing business as J. and J. Logging Co., from trespassing upon the property of plaintiffs Edgar L. Nace and Fern Nace, husband and wife, was asked in a suit filed Monday in circuit court.

The plaintiffs allege that "valuable" trees have been cut from the property, located near Glendale, and that the defendants have constructed a roadway over the property, all to the plaintiff's damage and over their protests.

Rossellini Gets New Blast From Senator Johnson

WASHINGTON, March 28.—(P)—Senator Edwin C. Johnson (D-Colo.) says that narcotics are being smuggled into Hollywood from Communist China.

Johnson, chairman of the Senate Commerce committee, made this statement on the Senate floor yesterday in the course of a fresh attack he launched against the movie capital's distribution of the film "Stromboli."

Lashing out at RKO studios for backing Roberto Rossellini, Italian director of the film and father of actress Ingrid Bergman's son, Johnson said:

"He (Rossellini) has been for many years and is now a notorious cocaine addict. He associates habitually with an international gang of narcotic smugglers and dope runners. This criminal gang is credited with being the pipeline through which the supply of narcotics is smuggled into Hollywood from Communist sources in China."

Arguing that RKO had full knowledge of Rossellini when the studio entered into an arrangement with him for production of "Stromboli," Johnson added:

"Rossellini sold them on the idea that he would produce just what they were looking for, a red-hot, sexy film, lurid and devastating. Johnson said he made the statements because "I want the American public to understand clearly what type of individuals are mak-

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ing pictures for them." He added that he would have more to say about Hollywood and narcotics at a later date. It is, he said, "one of the most revolting and at the same time heart-breaking stories of all times."

Besides the drug addiction allegation, Johnson accused Rossellini of black marketeering and wartime collaboration with the Nazis.

Johnson, who has proposed licensing of actors and actresses and regulation of the interstate transportation of motion pictures, told the Senate that Rossellini "admitted" his drug addiction in open court while seeking an annulment of marriage to his last wife in

Austria. He said he regretted that the motion picture industry, which "rallies so wholeheartedly to every good cause, has a blind spot on the morals question."

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a sum to cover his pension would be entered in a "trust fund."

Medical Insurance Sought
Reuther said that if the \$30,000,000 were not funded there could be no provision for workers' "back service credits." These would be payments for years worked before the plan went into effect.

Absence of funding, Reuther added, reduces Chrysler's offer to the value of four cents an hour per worker. At the time of the offer last Friday the union estimated it at five cents. When the strike began Jan. 25, the UAW estimated Chrysler's initial offer at three cents. The union wants a ten cent package to cover pension and hospital and medical insurance.

Chrysler offered the \$30,000,000 as part of a five-year contract and the union indicated acceptance if it were increased by \$16,020,000.

Reuther said Chrysler rejected the counteroffer.

"The simple truth," Reuther said, "is that Chrysler is just not willing to make the same economic concessions that Chrysler competitors have made. The Chrysler strike is

not being settled because the company is not willing to meet the ten cent pattern."

The union claims ten cent packages from Ford, Nash-Kelvinator, and smaller firms.
