Indians Stage Work Session On Diamond

A bright sun saved Norm West's baseball squad from the prospect of a chalk talk session in the locker room, following cancellation of a practice game Tuesday with Coach Miles Aubin's Oakland Oaks.

Examination of the field earlier in the day showed it to be in a very damp state, but Coach West decided later to go ahead anyway, and the Indians got to display some pre-season form for the first time this season.

The players were divided into teams with each unit getting three innings of batting and fielding practice.

Beavers Edge Bradley For NCAA, NIT Titles

NEW YORK, March 29.—(AP)—Allegoroo! CCNY did it!

The Beavers from City College of New York beat Bradley last night to become the first team to make college basketball's grand slam—winning both the national invitation tourney championship and the NCAA championship in the same year.

CCNY, variously dubbed "the Cinderella team" and "the team of Destiny" completed its sweep of the nation's toughest teams by taking Bradley, 71-68, to replace Kentucky as the NCAA champion. A week ago Saturday the Beavers smacked Bradley, 69-61, to win the NIT title.

Whereas in their first meeting CCNY came from behind in the second half and gradually drew away, Bradley almost pulled the game out of the fire in the last 20 seconds last night.

Bradley Gets Chance
 Five seconds later the Beavers made a wild pass out of bounds, giving Bradley possession and a golden opportunity to turn defeat into victory.

Gene Melchiorre, who had intercepted CCNY passes and scored three consecutive baskets in the last two minutes, drove in for another shot.

But three taller CCNY players partially blocked his shot and recovered the ball. Floyd Layne fired the length of the floor to Norm Mager for an easy layup that sewed up victory for the Beavers. There were exactly seven seconds left. Bradley did not get another shot.

Rooters Go Wild
 Pandemonium broke out among CCNY rooters with their shouts of allegoroo, allegoroo—the school's rallying cheer—and their signs of "we did it before and we can do it again" and "Bradley's last stand."

Bradley was ranked No. 1 in the final Associated Press poll.

CCNY's sophomore club, unranked in the final A.P. poll because of three late season upsets at the hands of Canisius, Niagara and Syracuse, suddenly caught fire and finished the season with nine straight victories, including San Francisco, Kentucky, Duquesne and Bradley in the NIT and Ohio State, North Carolina State and Bradley, again, in the NCAA.

 Whoever is booming the Pacific Coast league as the "third" major league should have kept baseball Commissioner A. B. (Happy) Chandler away from that opener at Oakland.

Chandler sat with some amazement among 12,397 fans last night and saw eight pitchers yield 25 hits as the Oaks staggered to a 15-11 win over Seattle. The game had everything but good pitching. There were seven errors, 14 walks and two home runs, both by Oakland outfielder Roy Weatherly. It was the commissioner's first PCL opener.

In other openers, the champion Hollywoods lost a 4-3 tenning decision to Portland; Los Angeles beat Sacramento 12-11 after three hours and 25 minutes of the goofiest horseplay this side of a burlesque show and San Francisco lost its first opening day game in 11 years to San Diego 5-4.

The crowd of 5,738 was disappointing at Hollywood but the game itself was not. The Stars tied the game up in the ninth with a play that only could come out of Hollywood. Little Bob Bundy led off with a double. Eddie Sauer sacrificed him to third. Frankie Kelleher fled to left and Bundy hit for home after the catch.

Coming in head-first, he was knocked cold sliding into catcher Jimmy Gladd of Portland. Gladd scrambled for the ball as Bundy lay there inert—short of the plate. Murray Franklin, the next Hollywood batter, quickly reached down and put Bundy's motionless hand on the plate before Gladd tagged him.

Portland won in the tenth with two unearned runs. Luis Marquez singled, Johnny Rucker beat out a bunt and Steve Messner popped out. Then Mickey Rocco slapped a roller which Stevens threw wild to second, filling the bases. Marquez scored on Joe Brovia's outfield fly and Rucker tallied on Polich's single.

Beaver pitchers Lyman Linde and Bill Fleming combined to hold the Stars to four hits.

They tied for scoring honors, in their game, each piling up 12 points.

LaMotta Pounds Hunter For TKO in Sixth Round

CLEVELAND, March 29.—(AP)—Middleweight Champion Jake LaMotta, 168½, battered a hapless Chuck Hunter into submission at 59 seconds of the sixth round in a non-title fight last night.

Referee Jackie Davis stopped the bout and awarded the rock-jawed LaMotta a technical knock-out after Hunter, a Clevelander, had been down for a count.

Hunter's hands were down and his eyes were glazed as the Bronx boy moved in for a finisher. That was when Davis stopped it, although many of the 8,181 fans shouted to let it go on.

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
