High score for the day was racked up by Gordon Corum of Eugene with 99, B class. There were four ties for second: R. L. Peck, Gordon Miller, Dick Baker and John Willener, all of Eugene, scoring 98. Third place went to O. S. Ballew, Eugene, 97.

High in class C competition was Perry Thiele, Roseburg, and Lewis Jantzer, Medford, both with 96. Winner in the D class was R. N. Carmichael, Coquille, 91.

Jim Horn of Grants Pass won the handicap event with 47 of 50, with Forrest Solomon, Roseburg, and Dick Skeeters, Medford, runners-up. Gordon Miller of Eugene was high in doubles with 45.

Local shooters made perfect 75's in the telegraphic score, mainly due to the sharp eyes of Forrest Solomon, Charley Klinger and Dallas Bennett. Many of the members broke 24's.

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Clean Sweep In Hoop Tilts, Volleyball Set

Rose school made a clean sweep in the grade school tournament completed at the high school Wednesday night, winning both the Peeewe and Heavies basketball games and the girls' volleyball tilt.

Outstanding performance of the evening was the triple overtime Peeewe tilt between Rose and Fullerton schools, which Rose won 6-5 on a free throw by Billy Kelly.

The Heavies game saw the Rose club win in a 22-4 breeze, with Jimmy Coen carrying the weight on eight field goals and four free shots. Coen racked up the first seven points of the game, getting five in the first quarter.

In the volleyball championship conflict, Rose girls entertained little trouble in staying ahead of a weaker Benson aggregation, beating them 44-11, in the end.

In the consolation tussles Riverside and Benson split, with Riverside Peeweews scoring a 6-4 win while Benson Heavies walked away on the long end of a 15-4 tally.

Coen Looks Good
Coen's brilliant backboard prowess and scoring ability marked him as a real come. He appeared to know where to be on every play and seldom missed a shot at the bucket.

Little Bobby Gray also shined for the Rose Heavies, but he was held in check much more closely, than ever before.

Fullerton Heavies scored their six points on two shots by Leroy Sargent, following a long one by R. Sanders.

In the championship Peeewe game, Doughton of Rose sank the first one with one minute gone in the second quarter. Then Duane Whitlatch put Rose ahead 4-2, but Harpe again saved the day with an additional two-pointer to put the fourth quarter score at 4-even.

Free Throw Counts
Brady Montgomery of Rose boosted his squad ahead in the first overtime from the free throw line, but Dave Gordon evened it up at 5-5 with a gift shot of his own, with seconds to spare.

The second overtime went scoreless, then it was mutually agreed by both coaches that the game would be ended at the end of the third overtime, even if tied. But Kelly sank one from the gift stripe, putting Rose in the win column.

In the volleyball encounter, Janet Urbanek, Beverly Sims, captain; Susy Lee and Betty Roach figured prominently in the Rose win.

ASHLAND COACH RESIGNS
ASHLAND, March 30.—(AP)—Ashland's high school football coach, Frank O'Neil, has resigned, the school reported Wednesday.

However, he will continue with the school district as supervisor of health and physical education, working out a program for students from the fourth grade through high school.

No successor in the football position has been named. O'Neil is president of the Oregon State Coaches' association and also heads the Southern District association for physical education, health and recreation instructors.

He first coached here in 1941 and returned after a tour with the U.S. Navy.

Red McNulty came in and put the fire out at 3-3. The Beavers were scoreless in the tenth and the Stars were helpless in their half. But it made no difference.

Sauer Travels
Eddie Sauer walked, was waved to second on a balk and went to third on a grounder. Murray Franklin and Cliff Abernethy were purposely walked to fill the bases.

Mike Sandlock popped up and weak-hitting Johnny O'Neil stepped to the plate. With the count 0 and 2, McNulty reared up and threw one high above the catcher's savior for the ball game.

High Commissioner A. B. (Happy) Chandler saw his second PCL game in two days at Sacramento where Los Angeles made it two in a row over the Solons 9-3.

Pete Mallory, a 22-game winner last year for Nashville in the Southern association, checked Sacramento with eight hits. He had trouble only with the veteran Joe Marty who smashed his second homer of the infant season and later doubled to drive in all of the Solon runs.

The Angels counted six runs off Jack Brewer in the third off two walks and five singles.

At San Diego, Harry Simpson poked a long one over the right field wall with Bobby Wilson aboard in the fifth to give the Padres a 4-3 nod over San Francisco. It was San Diego's second straight win over the Seals.
