Aristophron, was a wealthy Egyptian cotton planter of Greek origin. They are daughters of workers whose ancestors have been there for generations.

Under the will, Janus' share was 8,000 acres, 200 camels, 150 donkeys and four of the 12 dancing girls. But his wife wouldn't let him bring the girls to the United States and now, Janus says, his aunt wants it all—"all the land, all the camels, all the burros and I suppose all the dancing girls."

New Step Taken To Guard Secrecy Of The H-Bomb

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Atomic Energy commission has taken a new step to assure the highest secrecy about its hydrogen bomb program.

The AEC disclosed that it has asked its employees and contractor personnel to say nothing in public about technical matters referring to a super bomb—even though the information might be non-secret.

"This would still permit unclassified (open) discussions of what might be called the classical thermonuclear reactions as long as there was no reference to their relations to weapons," said a commission statement issued at a news conference.

A thermonuclear reaction is one that involves the fusion of hydrogen atoms by heat—with a resultant release of atomic energy. It is such a reaction which scientists believe takes place in the sun and other stars.

Officials said the order is the second issued recently—the more recent one being a somewhat toned down version to meet objections raised by scientists who feared the first request might stifle classroom discussion.

Acting commission chairman Sumner Pike agreed with a reporter who suggested that the purpose of the move is to tell the atomic workers "to keep their traps shut."

Commissioner Gordon Dean added that the second request differed from the first in that it said, "PLEASE keep your traps shut."

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Elks Scholarship Award Won By Astoria Youth
ASTORIA, March 31.—(AP)—Winner of this year's state elks scholarship award is John Hensala, Seaside high school senior. Albert Hyde, Astoria, scholarship chairman, said Hensala was chosen for the \$300 award for scholarship, extra-curricular and out-of-school activities, personality and leadership. He will represent Oregon in the National Elks contest. Donald Hedgebeth, Grants Pass, was second.

10 Million People Use Recreation Areas in '49
PORTLAND, March 31.—(AP)—Regional Forester H. J. Andrews reported Thursday that an estimated 10,000,000 people had used recreational facilities of 19 national forests in Oregon and Washington last year.

He said this was a gain of 10 percent over 1948. The gain was part of an all-time record use of facilities nationally in the summer months.

Winter sports areas fell off, however, as much as 25 percent. Heavy weather marked the early part of last year.
