Cleveland Indians Expect To Capture American Pennant

TUCSON, Ariz.—The Cleveland Indians are convinced they are going to win the American league pennant. And they expect to do it largely with the same men who finished third last fall. Better physical condition and improved hitting are supposed to bring about the change. The new owners who took the club over from Bill Veeck are sticking by the Tribe's veteran infield, the oldest in the major leagues.

General Manager Hank Greenberg isn't worried over the fact that first baseman Mickey Vernon, second baseman Joe Gordon, shortstop Lou Boudreau and third baseman Ken Keltner average 33 years in age. "It's a question of playing ability, not years," Greenberg insists.

Vernon was the only one of the quartet that hit up to average in 1949. He has shaken off the challenge of rookie Luscious (Luke) Easter from San Diego and is expected to have another good year.

Chief challenger for his job is awkward but effective Herb Conyers, a rookie from Oklahoma City. This may be the last year in the majors for the great "Flash" Gordon. Earlier in the year he asked for his outright release to play in the Pacific Coast league so he would be able to spend most of the summer near his Eugene, Oregon home. Mexican-born Roberto Avila and rookie Bobby Wilson are being trained to take over Gordon's job.

Cleveland claims to have the strongest pitching staff in the league. It expects Bob Lemon, Bob Feller and Mike Garcia to each win 20 or more games. Gene Bearden is expected to regain the control that deserted him last season and be much more effective.

The veterans Early Wynn, Steve Gronck, Sam Zoldak and Al Benton are expected to help.

Jack O'Reilly's Title At Stake Saturday Night

Jack O'Reilly, the arrogant Australian, will need more than his effective hammerlock to retain his wrestling title he has held for well over a year.

O'Reilly defends the Pacific coast light-heavyweight wrestling title he has held for well over a year. O'Reilly defends the coveted coast crown at the Roseburg armory Saturday night against the challenger Andy Truman, the campaigner from Texas.

Except for a sickness of several months, O'Reilly has been the king for more elapsed time than any grappler in the business.

The Great Atlas, refusing to appear in a preliminary match, has been added to Saturday night's mat show as the principal of a "triple headliner," giving Douglas county fans a three-star performance. The former "Mr. America" from Hollywood, will be matched against Johnny Paavich, Hungarian new-

comer, in a three-fall, 30-minute skirmish. Atlas is also expected to give another exhibition of his strength prior to his match.
