

Prospector Group Is Organized To Aid Lone Miners

Walter J. Scott, Portland engraver, was in Roseburg Thursday in the interest of The United Prospectors, Inc. This, he said, is a non-profit organization and the only existing organization in the United States dedicated to assist the "lone prospector" in his work and aid him financially.

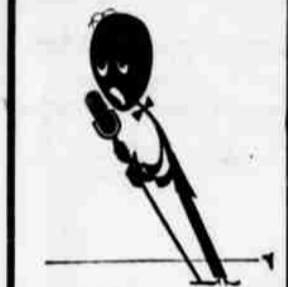
According to a pamphlet distributed by Scott, United Prospectors was formed for the express purpose of helping the prospector, and an invitation is extended to be come associated with "the friendliest bunch of new and experienced, young and old prospectors you can imagine." The organization claims members of both sexes from six months to 80 years over the United States and foreign countries.

The main object, states the pamphlet, is to "foster and stimulate the fascinating art of prospecting and to promote and disseminate useful mining information through our official booklet, called Panning Gold. These booklets are issued intermittently in series, the first issues being available." The articles and stories in Panning Gold booklets are written by prospector members.

The organization has an interest in 1,400 acres of placer ground close to Yosemite park, where the members are allowed to spend

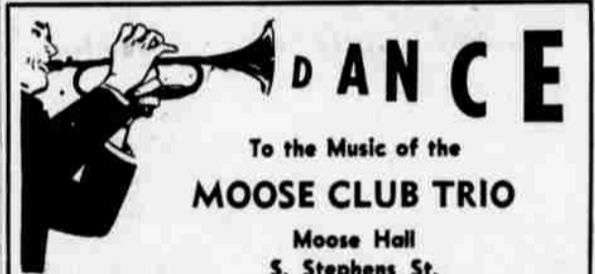

The awards to the patients' orchestra were made by Dr. John L. Haskins, Manager of the hospital, who announced that the hospital also received first and second places in vocal ensemble and honorable mention for number of participants.
