

Indians Open Baseball With 18-1 Victory

Yoncalla Team Provides Little Competition, But Roseburg Hitting Poor

The Roseburg Indians opened their season of baseball by smothering the Yoncalla Eagles 18-1 in a one-sided affair at Finlay field Friday afternoon.

Coach Norm West threw 25 players against Yoncalla's two available pitchers. Will Ray and Al Alsop, after the Indians built up a substantial 10-0 lead in the first two innings.

Tyrrel Wise, Yoncalla's leadoff man, was the only lead to score for the visitors. Roseburg's third pitcher of the day, Claren Hooper, walked Wise, who stole second and scored on two Roseburg errors. Coen Starts

Mickey Coen, winning pitcher, faced six batters in two innings, striking out two. Tom Johnson took over for two innings, struck out the first three men to face him, allowed the next man to walk, then three more went down in rapid succession. Bob Sullivan hurled the final inning; gave up the only Yoncalla hit of the ballgame. Jerry Boan, Eagle catcher, singled to right off Sullivan but Dan McDonald, preceding Boan, was caught going to third, for the final out.

Roseburg, although enjoying a field day of runs, failed to come through with the hits. Their run column belied Roseburg activity at the plate. However, the Indians did come through with four bunched hits in a big fifth inning. Helliwell Hits

Jim Helliwell, Indian second baseman, launched the fifth inning hitting spree with a blow into short center field. He was followed by Sanders, who batted second, and Barry Kenny and Claren Hooper, each dragging down singles.

John Rauschert gained the first hit of the ballgame, a hot grounder to pitcher Ray in the first, who fielded it too late.

Frank Olson, Roseburg shortstop, followed in the second inning with the only double of the game, scoring three men on the blow.

Lloyd Stumbo followed in the third with a single that scored Gene Henry, who had walked.

Bases on balls allowed by the Yoncalla pitchers accounted for 10 of Roseburg's runs, while two errors, a hit batter, and a fielders choice put the other Indian scores on base.

Three Roseburg runs were earned.

Coast Light Heavyweight Title Goes On Block Tonight

The Pacific coast light-heavyweight wrestling championship goes on the block at the Roseburg Armory arena Saturday night, with Jack O'Reilly, the titleholder from Australia defending his championship against the challenge of Andy Truman, the sensational campaigner from Texas.

Although Truman beat O'Reilly in a non-title match here last week, the champ will be the favorite with the blue chips down. Truman has been unbeaten since taking leave from the Border Patrol less than two months ago, losing only a tag-team match and being held to a draw by Leo Wallick, the Detroit piledriver.

The attractive opening match, starting at 8:30 p. m., will be a scientific skirmish matching Frankie Stojak, the ex-WSC athlete and airplane spin exponent, against one of the most brilliant young stars in the sport—Cal Roberts of Vancouver, B. C.

A near-record crowd is expected for Saturday's show. Elton Owen will referee both bouts.

Graziano, Janiro Battle To Draw In Garden Brawl

NEW YORK, April 1.—(AP)—Rocky Graziano still is the magic box-office name in boxing even though some of the dynamite may have gone out of golden boy's right hand bombs.

The former middleweight champion unlimbered his mighty right time and again at handsome Tony Janiro last night but not once could he bring down the game, comeback kid from Youngstown, O.

At the end of ten rounds of brawling in Madison Square Garden, Rocky, a 5 to 12 favorite, had to settle for a draw with his 22-year old rival. Janiro took the first half of the fight and Rocky captured most of the rounds in the final half.

"I couldn't get off," said the crestfallen New Yorker. "The kid takes a good punch but I never nailed him right. What I need is a couple of more fights to loosen me up."

"I thought I beat him," said Janiro, the reformed playboy who is back in the money again. "I'd like to fight him again. I'll take him for sure then. I hurt my right hand in the third round and it pained me when I used it."

Return bout is just what Harry Markson, director of the promoting International Boxing club, would like to put on when the circus pulls out of the Garden in May.

Rocky, making his first fighting appearance in the Garden in four years, pulled in the biggest boxing crowd (16,983 cash customers) and richest gate (\$81,049 at a \$10 top) of the winter season here.

Flow Of Streams To Be Average

PENDLETON, (AP)—Summer streamflows of average to 15 percent above average for the last ten years with probability of good water supplies for the entire area were forecast here Friday at the annual meeting of the Umatilla-Walla Walla forecast committee in charge of W. T. Frost of Medford, representing the SCS and the Oregon Agricultural Experiment station.

Snow cover in the mountain watersheds is generally 70 to 100 percent of that last year and 84 to 128 percent of that the year previous, the heavy streamflow year.

The prediction for a Umatilla streamflow 114 percent of the ten year average was made, John Venable, superintendent of McKay reservoir near Pendleton, and Harold Werth, Hermiston extension agent, reported a good water supply for irrigation purposes at both McKay and Cold Springs reservoirs.

Agriculturally the outlook in this region is very favorable with the probability that water supplies will be adequate throughout, Frost said. A similar meeting will be held at Union Saturday.

The four-day-old Pacific Coast league season has no undefeated teams today and there are just two places in the standings—first and last.

As the result of Friday night's hostilities, Los Angeles, San Diego, Hollywood, and Seattle are tied at three victories and one defeat apiece. The other four entries in the loop are knotted at one triumph and three setbacks each.

Last night's bill of fare was especially notable for one hackle-raising 12-inning scrap between Oakland and Seattle and, conversely, a comedy of errors involving the San Francisco Seals and the San Diego Padres.

Oaks Outfit Rainiers

At Oakland, the Acorns outfit the Rainiers, but Seattle stayed in there to win the game, 7 to 6, when Dick Sinovic brought in two runs with a 12th inning double. Prior to that, Don Padgett and Mel Duezabou boomed out pinch hit homers to keep the Oaks in contention for 11 innings.

At San Diego, on the other hand, the Padres and the Seals bumbled through a three-hour clown act that might well have found the Ringling brothers trembling with envy. San Francisco won, 13 to 7, for their first triumph in 15 league starts. The Seals dropped the last 11 games of the 1949 season and their first three this year.

Nine pitchers saw duty during the affair. One was ejected under official protest. There were numerous walks, balks, hit batters and assorted errors.

The other games were fairly normal. Hollywood shaded Portland again, 6 to 5, making the third straight night the Beavers have lost by one run. It was a teeter-totter arrangement, but the Twinkies led it away, actually, with two runs in the seventh. Ben Wade went the distance for the 1949 champs, surviving a rocky third inning when the Beavers scored three on two walks, a fielder's choice and two singles.

At Sacramento, the Solons ended a three game losing streak with a 2 to 1 conquest of Los Angeles. Bill Evans, up from Memphis, twirled a four hitter for Sacramento. He had a man on first in every inning, but managed to keep the fire from spreading.
