

Poster Contest Dated For Green Guards Of Oregon

Douglas county's hundreds of Green Guard members are being invited to take part in the 6th annual state-wide fire prevention poster contest sponsored each year by the Keep Oregon Green association.

The hundreds of local Green Guards, the youth auxiliary of the Keep Oregon Green association, may enter contest posters from April 1st to 30th according to County Keep Oregon Green chairman, V. V. Harpham, Roseburg.

Green Guards will be divided into two divisions: Junior division including all members from 8 to 12 years of age, and the Senior division including those from 13 to 16 years old.

There will be 6 cash prizes in each division with a \$25 cash award and a trip to the Oregon state forest nursery, near Oregon State college, Corvallis, to the two division first-place winners. The size of the poster will be 11x14. Only one poster may be submitted by each Green Guard. All posters will become the property of the Keep Oregon Green association, after judgment.

Green Guards must use a fire prevention theme and the posters will be judged on originality, relation to educational phases of fire prevention and artistic qualities. They may be in cut-outs, water colors, poster paint, oils, pastels, or wax crayons.

Tree Planting Ceremonies Held On Lower Umpqua

The annual tree planting ceremonies of the Lower Umpqua area was held Friday afternoon, with 465 school children from Reedsport and Gardiner participating.

The children planted a total of 13,500 seedlings, including Douglas fir, Scotch pine, Port Orford cedar and ponderosa pine. The Crown Zellerbach company donated 2,500 Port Orford cedar seedlings which were planted in Elliott State park.

The tree planting ceremonies were attended by lumber representatives and school officials from surrounding communities, as well as representatives from the state forest department and Keep Oregon Green association. Sponsoring lumber companies included Gardiner, E. K. Woods, Bridge, Doernbecher and Manschreck.

The annual affair was first started in the Lower Umpqua region under the sponsorship of lumber concerns in cooperation with the schools. It has since spread to other coastal towns and inland to other lumbering areas in the state.

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Rev. H. P. Sconce, Baptist Church Pastor, Resigns

Concluding 10½ years active service as pastor of the Roseburg First Baptist church, the Rev. H. P. Sconce Sunday announced to his congregation, his resignation, effective not later than three months from this date.

In a letter, which he read during the Sunday morning services, he stated:

"For several months Mrs. Sconce and I have felt that a new voice is needed in the pulpit here in order to meet the challenge of the great new day in Roseburg. We have been informed by the advisory board that the church will strive to finish our new building to such an extent that it can be dedicated in the next three months."

He continued: "All of us are thankful for God's blessing upon the work during the past ten and a half years. We are also thankful for the good name the church has in the community and in the state and Northern Baptist convention. Under new leadership and a full church staff and with a great new church plant we can see a day soon when there will be a thousand in Sunday school and a similar program in the entire church. We must always keep the upward look and the forward look."

"We appreciate more than words can say the suggestion from the (building) committee that there will be a memorial in the new church to our son, Junior."

The Rev. Mr. Sconce announced no immediate plans. He said he and his wife are taking a little trip down the coast during spring vacation, but they will be back for Easter Sunday.

Progress Reviewed

Reviewing his work with the Roseburg church, Rev. Mr. Sconce said that the new church, now under construction in this city, is the third in which he has helped with the building program.

He said the new Grants Pass Baptist church was begun during his pastorate there. The decision to build the new Grant Park church in Portland was voted also while he was the pastor. The latter church is being dedicated this Easter Sunday.

The Rev. Mr. Sconce is president of the Oregon Baptist pastors, an office he has held the last two years.

He said Roseburg had a Baptist church membership of 300 and an annual budget of \$4,000 when he came here late in 1939. Today the membership is around 800, and the annual budget is \$50,000.

Structural Design Aids New Washington Stadium

SEATTLE, April 3.—(AP)—A saving of \$400,000 and several weeks' construction time on the \$1,500,000 addition to the University of Washington football stadium has been made possible through a unique structural design, engineer Sigmund Ivarsson says.

Ivarsson, consultant to architects for the project, originated the design which will permit welding of the double-deck addition, instead of riveting. He said it would be one of the biggest welding jobs ever attempted in the Pacific Northwest.

The first major shipment of steel is scheduled to arrive early this month.

The addition will increase the stadium's capacity from 40,000 to 55,000, with 20,000 of the seats under roof.

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Signs Will Point Way To Garbage Dump Site

Signs pointing the way to the Roseburg garbage disposal dump grounds will be installed by the county court in an effort to keep indiscriminate garbage and trash dumping to a minimum, County Engineer F. C. Frear announced today.

Pointing out that the disposal company makes no charge for dumping small quantities of rubbish, Frear said one sign will be erected in West Roseburg and a second beyond Kiwanis park. Frear said the road is graveled and passable and that there is plenty of turning room at the dump ground.

He emphasized it is easier to haul trash to the dump ground than to go out in the country and dump illegally on county roads.

Roseburg Joins In Cancer Crusade

Roseburg today joined other communities throughout the United States in officially opening the 1950 Cancer crusade. Heading local participation in the drive is Ed Nolte, finance chairman for the Douglas county chapter of the Oregon division, American Cancer society.

The current drive is described by the national chairman, Maj. Gen. William J. Donovan, as the "most intensive attack ever launched against cancer."

The drive has as its objectives a goal of \$14,565,000 to finance American Cancer society work and a second objective in alerting the nation to cancer's danger signals.

Nolte today urged persons throughout the country to contribute generously in an effort to further research work and treatment carried on by the parent organization. He said that 60 percent of all money raised here will remain in the state for further research.

Nolte said donations may be mailed to American Cancer society, Roseburg.

Other county officers include Ivan Pickens, treasurer; Dr. B. R. Shoemaker, medical advisor; and Mrs. L. G. Twohy, education chairman; all of Roseburg.

Heading the drive in other Douglas county cities are Rev. H. Taylor, Canyonville; Mrs. James McGinty, Myrtle Creek; Mrs. Cowan, Yoncalla; Mrs. W. Van Orden, Scottsburg and Mrs. Lewis, Reedsport.

Nolte said that other appointees representing the remainder of the county's communities will be named this week.
