Wonder Drugs Aiding Growth Of Poultry, Pigs

SEATTLE, April 5.—Can
science produce a race of super-
men or superanimals?
Scientists weren't ready today to
say, but two of their number dis-
closed that use of three new won-
der drugs has increased the growth
of animals "remarkably" over
those fed all the other known es-
sential nutrients.

The two scientists are Dr. E. L.
R. Stokstad of Lederle laborato-
ries, Pearl River, N.Y., and Dr.
James McGinnis of Washington
State college. Their reports were
given last night at a nutritional
conference.

Involved in the experiments were
feed supplements produced as by-
products in the making of three
antibiotics—auricomycin, strepto-
mycin and terramycin.

Dr. Stokstad said the growth rate
of pigs more than doubled when
auricomycin fermentation products
were added to peanut meal. A ma-
terial boost was given growth with
its addition to soybean oil meal
and fish meal. A half ounce of au-
reomycin to a ton of feed produced
the best results.

Dr. McGinnis' work was with
poultry—turkey and chicks—and
with the other drugs—streptomycin
and terramycin. The growth re-
sults were similarly increased.

Primary importance of the ex-
periments to animal raisers is the
apparent ability of the drugs to
produce a more rapid maturity.
Such an accomplishment would
materially reduce the time gap
between birth and marketing. Les-
ened also would be the overall
cost of feeding.

New Holy Land Regime Approved

GENEVA, Switzerland, April 5
—(AP)—The United Nations trust-
eeship council Tuesday formally
approved a statute setting up an
international regime for the Jeru-
salem area—a move bitterly op-
posed by both Israel and Hashe-
mite Jordan.

The U.N. has no actual power
to enforce internationalization and
council President Roger Garreau
of France was instructed to seek
the "full cooperation" of Israel
and Jordan, who now occupy the
divided Holy city.

Garreau was instructed to re-
port to the June council session
on answers from Israel and Jo-
rdan. Both states opposed interna-
tionalization during the debate in
which the U.N. general assembly
voted last December to set up a
separate regime for the religious
center.

The statute, which provides for
a U.N. governor and a supreme
court to administer Jerusalem and
surrounding territory, was ap-
proved without opposition, but the
United States and Britain ab-
stained from voting.

Israel claims Jerusalem as the
"eternal capital" of the Jewish na-
tion. Jordan's King Abdullah has
declared that the Arab section of
Jerusalem is part of his kingdom.
