

Indians Take Second Game From Yoncalla

Norm West's Indians made it two in a row against Coach Dick Stralt's Yoncalla Eagles in a seven-inning tilt at Yoncalla Tuesday night, defeating the host club 26-4.

Assistant coach Eddy Wyatt, who accompanied the group because Coach West was having a tooth removed at the dentist, let every player on the 23-man traveling squad participate.

They maintained a steady scoring pace the first four innings, then spurted ahead in the fifth, turning nine walks and three hits into 11 runs.

Pitchers Come Through
Roseburg's pitching staff came through with flying colors. Mickey Coen stopped the first three men to face him, then Claren Hooper ended the game by whipping the last five men. Winning pitcher was Tom Johnson, who struck out four.

The losing mound aggregation proved to be a wild bunch, especially pitcher Will Ray, who walked nine.

Dexter Garey, Glen Scofield and Claren Hooper each gained two-base hits, while pitcher Coen clobbered one for three sacks.

Yoncalla's Larry scored first for the losers, after drawing a walk. He was singled in by E. Wise, who also scored on a single by Lloyd.

In the sixth, T. Wise singled, Waters went to first on an error, then both scored on additional Roseburg errors.

Major League Pitchers Find Thorny Path

They may work their way into the clear later, but numerous major league moundmen are finding the path through the citrus circuit strewn with thorns.

Among the big-time flingers meeting with assorted reverses are Rae Scarborough, Washington Senators; Hal Newhouser, Detroit Tigers; Bob Feller, Cleveland Indians; Vic Raschi, New York Yankees; Ellis Kinder, Boston Red Sox, and Dave Koslo, New York Giants.

A few other stars could be added to the list, having failed to approach their true form or joined the stiff and sore arm brigade along the grapefruit trail.

Good Last Year
Last season, Koslo was the most effective pitcher in the National league, sporting an earned run average of 2.50. Southpaw Dave went into yesterday's game against Cleveland with a spring record of allowing nine runs, 19 hits and 12 bases on balls in 17 innings.

Koslo pitched eight and two-thirds innings, during which he walked six, made a wild pitch, gave seven runs and seven hits. Cleveland won, 7-6, handing the Giants their fifth straight defeat.

Newhouser, famed ace of the Tigers, has a mysterious ailment in his pitching arm, which has baffled everyone. All he knows is that it hurts when he pitches and, having tossed only a couple of innings, Hal is at least temporarily sidelined.

Feller Gives 12 Runs
Feller, no longer the great fireballer of yore, gave up 12 runs and 14 hits over a six inning stint in his most recent dull showing against the Chicago Cubs last Sunday. He has appeared far from his old self this spring.

Scarborough has yet to reveal any of his 1949 effectiveness. Only last Monday, working eight innings against the Springfield, Mass. International league club, Rae was found for 17 hits. This spring, he has been reached for 20 runs and 36 hits in 17 innings.

Raschi went seven innings against the Cincinnati Reds last Monday and again failed to resemble the hurler he was last year. Vic allowed five runs, nine hits and four walks.

Kinder, last Sunday, hurled five innings against Detroit, giving up as many runs—four in the fifth inning.

Ed Miller Signed
On the Florida front yesterday, pitcher Hank Wyse was signed by the Philadelphia Athletics for a reported \$8,000 and veteran infielder Eddie Miller, recently released by the Philadelphia Phillies, became a St. Louis Cardinal, reportedly for \$13,500.

Joe DiMaggio hit a three-run homer for the Yankees but the world champions lost to Detroit, 6-4. The victory gave the Tigers a clean sweep of a four-game series.

Third baseman Grady Hatton may be out of the Cincinnati Reds' lineup until after the National league season starts. It was revealed yesterday that he had a broken toe on his right foot as the result of being struck by a foul off his own bat in Monday's game with the Yankees.

Canucks Beaten In Overtime

The Pacific Coast league's second round of openers had everything—big crowds, great pitching, home runs and free peanuts.

In the crowd department, biggest success was Portland's afternoon and night doubleheader with Oakland which drew a total of 19,392 fans. The Beavers showed their appreciation by winning both games by the identical score of 7-2. Red Adams pitched the afternoon win and Roy Heiser got credit for the night job. Portland piled up five runs in the seventh inning of the first game to sew up that one. In the nightcap, a three-run third iced it.

Hurts Three-Hitter
Pinky Woods of Hollywood threw a three-hitter to spoil Seattle's debut before \$13,494 homeowners. Woods had a one-hitter on the fire until the ninth when Lonnie Frey lashed a line double, actually Seattle's only honest hit. Bill Schuster followed with a floating fly that dropped safe, but Woods quickly put out the Rainiers' fire. The Stars won 4-0.

Another fine pitching job was turned in at San Francisco by Elmer Singleton who retired the last 18 men in order to beat Sacramento 6-4. He threw no hit, no run ball the last five innings after being a little wobbly at the start. The Solons pulled a triple play.

PGA Rumpus Calmer Today

AUGUSTA, Ga., April 5.—(AP)—The tempest within the PGA was temporarily calmed today but it's almost certain that things never will be the same again after a show-down meeting here Monday.

The meeting was originated by the PGA executive committee to smooth the touchy feelings of many of the nation's greatest golfing stars.

Although George Scheiner, spokesman for the unhappy linksmen, was not invited to the meeting, there are indications that several of his "board of governors" will attend anyway.

Lawson Little, one of the governors representing stars who demand more authority in managing tournaments, said: "There will be meetings and we'll get everything worked out. We touring golfers will get a bigger voice in running our affairs."

Jimmy Thomson, another governor, added that he was invited as an individual and intended going to the meeting.

Other governors, including such gold plate golfers as Sam Snead, Jimmy Demaret, Ben Hogan and Cary Middlecoff, did not indicate their intentions.

Horton Smith, as secretary of the PGA, says the pros can have added authority if affairs turn out well Monday.

Scheiner was slashed from the PGA payroll Monday as tournament director. Smith and PGA President Joe Novak charged the Ogden, Utah, golfer with failure to comply with PGA policies.

Late last night, just after arriving from his Chicago firing, Scheiner said he would not "force an issue on not being invited to the conference."

Smith and other golfers are here for the fourteenth masters tournament. Scheiner is not qualified for an invitation to play.

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Tag-Team Match Set For Armory

Jack O'Reilly, Pacific coast light heavyweight champion, and Leo Wallick, the dynamic piledriving expert from Detroit, will be favored to win a tag-team match at the Roseburg armory Saturday night—featuring the weekly wrestling show.

O'Reilly, the arrogant Australian, and Wallick, who has crippled no less than a half dozen grapplers in the last two months, will meet Gordon Hessel of Albuquerque, N. M., and Ted Bell, the sensational New Jersey stylist.

Hessel hasn't been here since before Christmas, when he lost to Wallick, and he requested Matchmaker Elton Owen to match him against Wallick in one of the 20-minute, two-fall preliminaries. The other preliminary match will send O'Reilly against Bell.

O'Reilly is the only one of the quartet returning this week. It was a long day for the champion who wrestled Frankie Stojack in an exhibition at the veterans hospital in the afternoon. That night he had a torrid time in holding Andy Truman, the tough and formidable Texan, to a one-hour draw.

Reserved seat tickets are available at Powell's and one of the largest crowds in recent weeks is expected.
