80th Birthday Observed

Mrs. Ruth McGee of Canyonville, a native Oregonian, celebrated her 80th birthday at her home last week. Her daughter, Mrs. Ralph Weaver and daughter-in-law, Mrs. Guy McGee were hostesses at a birthday tea honoring her March 15.

Mrs. McGee was born March 15, 1870 near Albany Oregon and in 1876 the family moved to Douglas county and settled near Myrtle Creek. Her parents, the Thomas McLains came to Oregon by the Oregon trail in 1847 and settled near Albany. A McLain family reunion is held yearly there and Mrs. McGee attends. One of the oldest clans in the United States. One group of the clan holds its reunion in Louisiana yearly.

Mrs. McGee recalls many experiences she has encountered since moving to Canyonville. One was a terrific windstorm which blew a great deal of timber down between Canyonville and Astoria. The marks of the storm are still seen in the canyon passage.

She also recalls when Canyonville had 17 saloons at one time, when the deer were so plentiful they were slaughtered by the hundreds for the hides; and when the salmon were so thick in the South Umpqua above Tiller it was difficult during spawning time to cross the river on horseback.

Her three sons, Orville and Guy of Canyonville; and Virgil of Nyssa served in the World Wars. She has two daughters, Mrs. Ralph Weaver of Canyonville and Mrs. James Malloy of Nyssa.

She has many relatives living near Albany; a brother, Gene McLain, of Canyonville; a sister, Mrs. Lou Bernard of Klamath Falls; two cousins, Grover and Arch Lady of Canyonville.

Mrs. McGee is in excellent health and is active in the Methodist church and the Ladies Aid society. The tea table was covered with a gold and white cloth with a birthday cake and 80 candles as the centerpiece. Mrs. Weaver baked the cake and bouquets of daffodils were placed about the rooms.

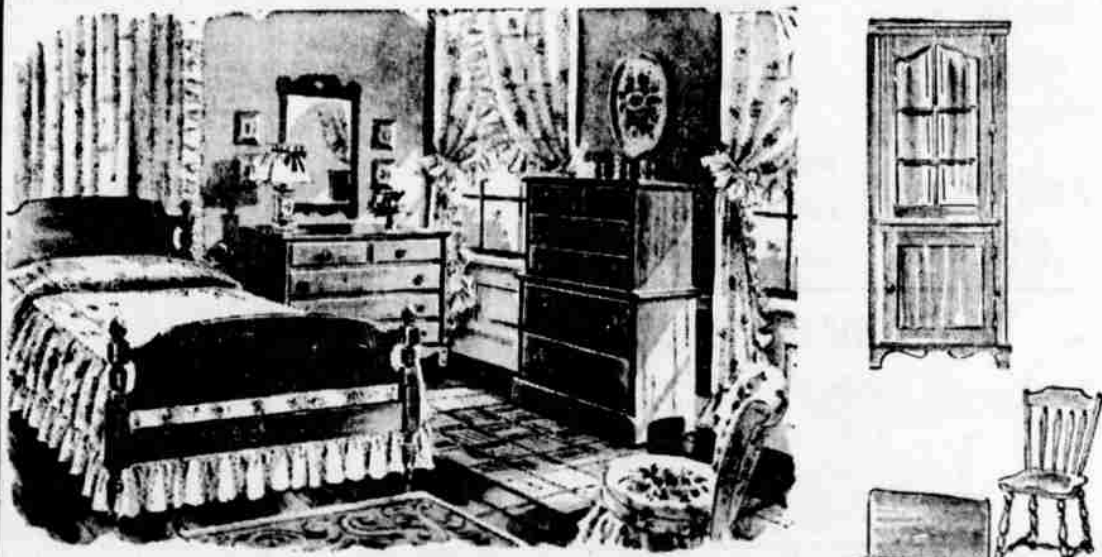
Volleyball, badminton and cards were enjoyed during the social hour, after which refreshments were served.

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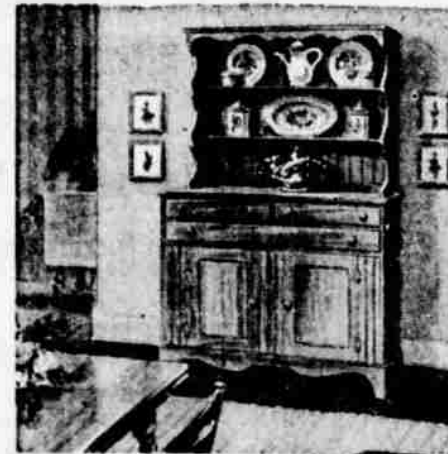
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
