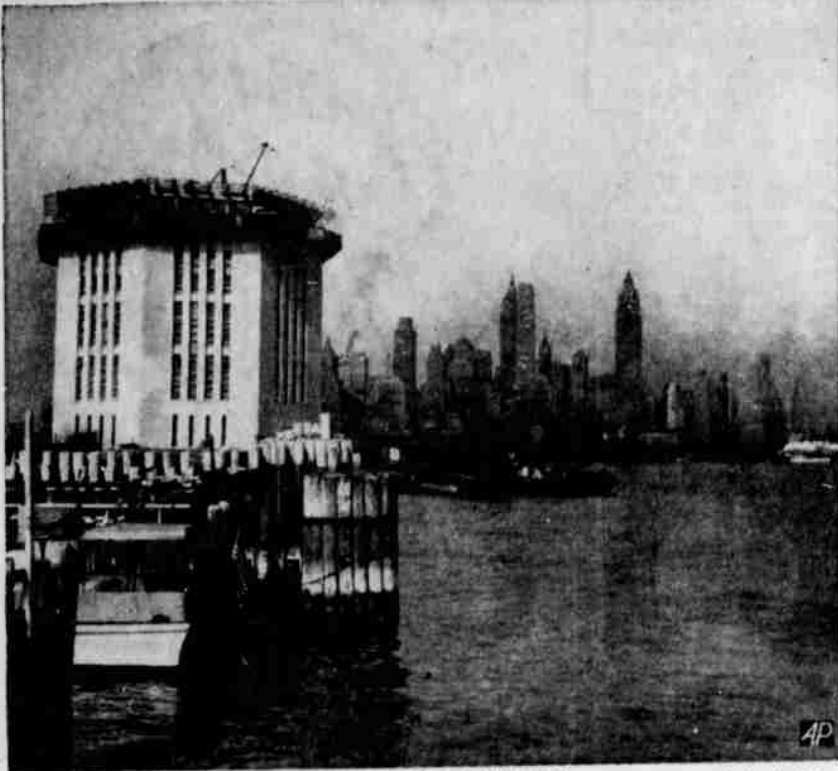

Park Commission Lists Many Improvements In 3-Month Period, With Funds Still Left

Although hampered to some extent by winter weather, the Roseburg Park commission lists decided improvements to park facilities during the last three months to April 1, according to the activities report submitted by Chairman Percy Croft.

Considerable work, both in improving and maintaining, was done to Umpqua park. Cement posts have been installed completely around the park, including the playground area. The community fireplace is ready for use and the base has been poured for the community kitchen. Water lines are being laid to provide means to maintain the lawn around the picnic area.

A new fence 28 feet high was built on the east side of the Commercial street tennis courts. Power poles were cemented in the ground, and an attractive fence was constructed to eliminate the balls going into the yards of people living next to the courts. The back and front fences were also repaired and painted.

Swim Pool Improved

The interior of the swimming pool administration building has been painted. The tile, damaged last winter, is partly patched. The bottom of the pool has been scraped ready for painting. The machinery in the filter room has been painted and made ready for the summer season. Wood-slat foot boards have been installed in both the ladies and men's dressing rooms, to prevent clothes getting on the wet floors. The numbering of the basket lockers will be revamped for the season. A general cleanup will be given the entire facility soon.

Trees have been trimmed and the grass maintained at Laurelwood park. Five trees that fell during the stormy weather were removed, and the park was cleaned. A merry-go-round is being made to be installed in the Eagles park across from the Elks building. The equipment and grounds have been maintained through the winter months.

New signs have been installed at the Public library. The lawn and shrubs have been maintained. Broken benches at the band stand

Fight Developing Over Security Value Of Budget

WASHINGTON, April 6.—(AP)—An angry battle is developing in Congress over how much security the administration's new defense budget will buy America.

In the camp protesting "not enough" is Rep. Vinson (D-Ga.), supported by Republican and Democratic members of the House armed services committee Vinson heads.

In the opposing camp are President Truman, Secretary of Defense Johnson, Chairman Mahon (D-Tex.) of the House military appropriations subcommittee.

Their stand is that the proposed \$13,911,127,000 budget for the fiscal year beginning in July is "sufficient for present needs."

Caught in the cross-fire are the military joint chiefs of staff, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and economy-advocating congressmen of both parties.

Johnson and the joint chiefs returned from Europe just in time to be hit by Vinson's opening blast in debate on the appropriation bill in which he urged that \$583,259,211 more be added for warplanes for the Air Force and Navy.

Vinson told Congress that under the administration's military program American air power will wither on the vine at a time when the Russians are building the largest air force in the world "for use whenever their carefully-timed Pearl Harbor day comes around."

Tired Of Commercials? Try This Little Gadget

PHILADELPHIA, April 6.—(AP)—Tired of listening to radio commercials? A University of Pennsylvania Physicist has an answer for you.

Dr. I. Clyde Cornog disclosed that he has developed what he calls an "advertiser killer." It is described in the American Journal of Physics.

With Dr. Cornog's electronic circuit gadget installed, you sit in your armchair, a switch by your hand. When you wish, you press a button and off goes the radio for a certain, predetermined, period of time, say a minute.

The physicist said he created the gadget — which anyone with scientific know-how can make for \$20 — because of radio commercials.

Said he: "One just gets tired of them."

ference he had ordered the joint chiefs of staff to restudy the budget to determine whether more money should be asked for Air Force and Navy planes.

Eisenhower, credited with having helped draft the pending budget, said last week he now thought \$500,000,000 should be added to it.

The former Army chief of staff then recommended particularly the strengthening of Alaskan defenses and more modern planes for the Navy and Air Force.

Johnson told reporters he believed that all the military forces and equipment recommended by Eisenhower can be obtained within the pending budget.
